### MRS WILLIAM PETERS

The death occurred on Monday the 17th inst at 3.15 a.m. at the home of her daughter Mrs Sanford Boyden Dorchester Mass., of Caroline E wife of William Peters, of Florenceville N.B. aged 63 years and 9 months. Death was caused by heart failure. Mrs Peters had not been in very good health for some weeks, but on Friday the 15th she became much worse and on Saturday she became unconscious remaining in that condition until her death early Monday morning.

The remains arrived in Florenceville on Wednesday last accompanied by her son Allan. Before leaving Dorchester a short service was held at the house by the Rev Mr Kimball (Episcopal). She leaves to mourn their loss her husband, three sons, James of Florenceville, Allan of New Bedford, Mass. and Raymond of Roxbury Mass. and one daughter Mrs Sanford Boyden of Dorchester, Mass. also several grand children.

The funeral took place on Thursday at 2.30, service at the house being conducted by the Rev M H Manuel assisted by the Rev D Fiske and at the church by the Rev M H Manuel, assisted by the Rev John Perry and the Rev J D Wetmore. Interment was made in the family lot in the cemetery of the old Congregational church. The funeral conductor was H H McCallin. The pall bearers were W L McCallin, W A Taylor, A McKay and J E Jewett. Relatives from St John and Woodstock were present at the funeral. Mrs Peters was a daughter of the late Charles S and Letitia Burpee Appleby and a sister of the late Stephen B Appleby.

### GEORGE CLARK.

George Clark, a veteran of the civil war, died Saturday, April 15, at the National Soldiers Home at Togus. He had served in the civil war and was slightly wounded at the Battle of Wilderness. He was born at St Leonards October 30, 1823. He married Miss Martha Russell June 25, 1853. To this union ten sons and one daughter were born, of whom only three sons survive—William H and John A of this town and James P of Four Falls, who served three years in the Philippine war. Since the death of his wife, which occurred March 25, 1899, he has made his home part of the time in this town and part of the time at the Soldiers Home. He went to Togus last June and expected to visit Fort Fairfield this summer. He was a very worthy man and was well liked and respected by all, who knew him.
