OPENING OF G.T.P. IN NEW BRUNSWICK IS LIKELY SOON

Ottawa, April 23 | General Manager Chamberlain, of the Grand Trunk Pacific, accompanied by Chief Engineer Woods, left for New Brunswick today to inspect that portion of the Transcontinental road between Moncton and Plaster Rock.

It is probable that the operation of this portion of the Railway will begin soon, and the visit of these officials is no doubt preparatory to that step.

It is stated that the Grand Trunk Pacific has plenty of rolling stock ready to place upon the road, and while the station houses are not in readiness yet for the purpose of a start, the engineers headquarters along the line could be used instead until these buildings are ready.
