One Man Arrested In Barker Robbery

April 2nd. With one man under arrest and the police working on the case, the robbery on Friday night of the home of J C E Barker when more than \$2,000 worth of rare jewels were taken, continues to be the greatest sensation this city has had for many months. Another arrest according to the police, may result in a few hours. Till then they decline to give out the name of the man they have in custody.

The robbery at the Barker home occurred between 8.45 and 9.20 on Friday evening. It is the belief of Mr and Mrs Barker and the police. The family was then away and for the short time the thieves had full charge to gather the jewels undisturbed.

There are some peculiar features about the robbery which adds to the interest in it. The jewels were the only thing taken from the home. The jewels were in a bag and a tin box, both of which were found yesterday morning in the rear yard of the Barker home. That nothing else was disturbed and these were extracted neatly and successfully from the shelf in the closet where they had been left by Mrs Barker, arouses the suspicion that the robber either was a professional or else it was someone who knew the habits of the Barker family and knew, also, that the bag found was the one in which they kept their jewels.

When they arose yesterday morning, Mr Barker looked out of the window and there on a rose briar he saw the bag from which the jewels had been taken. Not sure of his observations at first he called his wife to look but she remembered it was April 1 and thought he was joking her. Finally she saw he was serious and she looked out the window. But one glance was necessary for her to know they were the victims of a robbery. She hastened to the closet fully conscious her worst forebodings were to become sad realizations. There she found the jewel bag had been stolen. But what was her greater dismay to ascertain too, that the box on which the bag had lain was also gone and in that had been kept some jewelry, but none so valuable as the bag contained.

The police were quickly notified. A search was started and the tin box was found in the rear yard but the robbers overlooking no chances of valuables getting away, had taken everything it contained.

Son-in-laws were quickly developed and it was a busy afternoon with the police. About 3 o'clock two of the officers left the central station and came back shortly after 5 with a prisoner. He was acquainted in the neighborhood and it has been said he has a past record which caused the police to act quickly when they knew of the case. Evidences of an attempt to enter one or two other homes near the Barker residence were discovered but no other losses were reported.
