WEATHER STATISTICS.

Chancellor Jones of the U N B. on Satur day morning gave out the weather statistics for the month of March from the local Meteo rological Bureau. The average temperature during March was 23 degs. The average for the last 38 years is 26,40. The maximum temperature was registered on the 26th be ing 49.5 degs. The minimum temperature was 10 degs on the 7th.

There were 185 hours of bright sunshine during the month, and the total wind velocity was 6,889, or an average of 9.3 miles per hour. In 1909 the average velocity was 84 miles per hour.

The total rain fall was 1.58 inches, and the totol snow fall 19 inches.

The total precipitation was 3 48 inches, or an average of 4.06 inches.
