Miss Ella Patterson returned on Saturday from Edmundston for a short visit with her parents here.

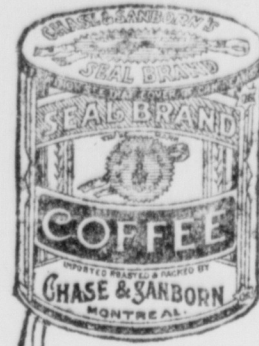

Mrs William Tweedie and Miss Mabel McTabrooks spent the week end with friends in Knoxford.

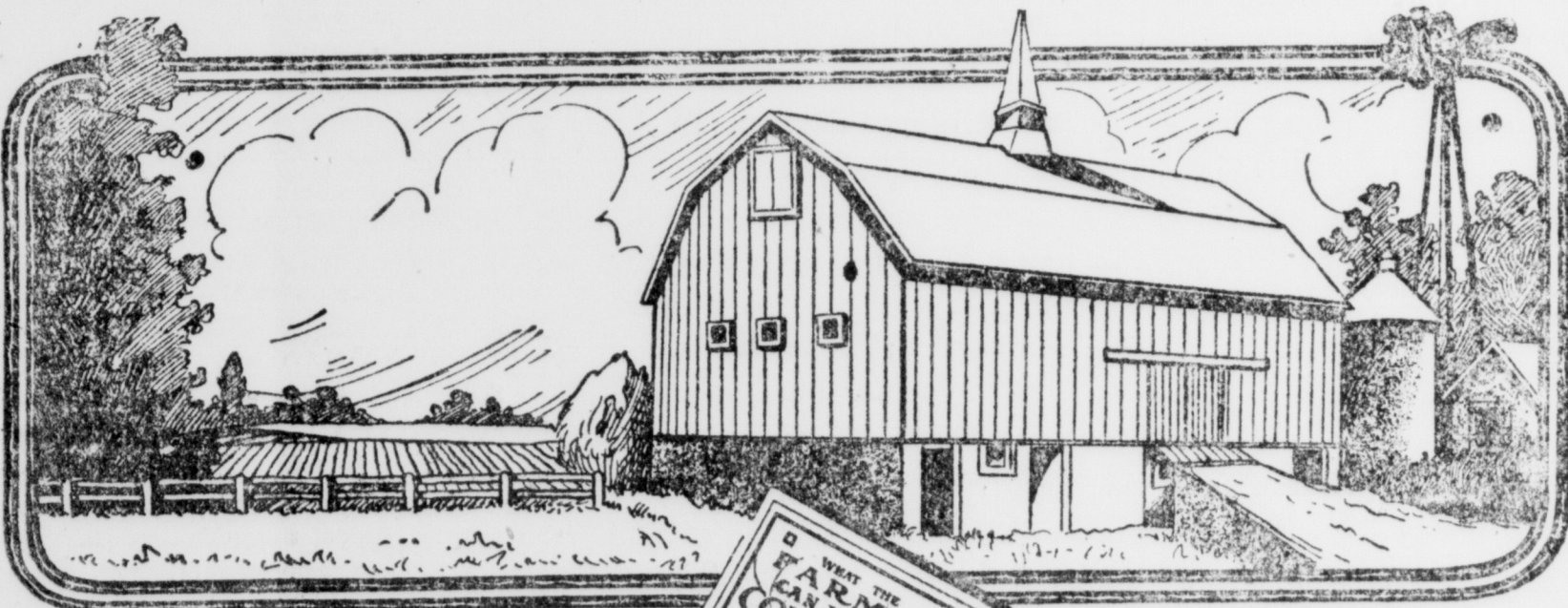
We are glad to report Miss Lillian Shaw as slowly improving in health.
