HOUSE AND SENATE ARE NOW BUSY

WASHINGTON, May 3.—With the house struggling toward a vote on the free list bill, and the Senate Committee on Finance hearing arguments on Cana- dian reciprocity, today signaled the real beginning of the tariff extra session. Hith- erto consideration of tariff legislation practically has been confined to the House. By an agreement reached yesterday by the Senate Finance Committee, objections are not confined to the reciprocity meas- ure solely, but because of its intimate re- lationship to the entire tariff question are extended to include the free list measures. Hearing will extend throughout next week. The Senate was not in session to day, but will be tomorrow.

SIR WILFRID WILL GO TO CORONATION

OTTAWA, May 3.—Sir Wilfrid Laurier will likely go to the Imperial Confer- ence and to the Coronation, and will prob- ably sail from Canada on May 12. It is understood that there has been a confer- ence between Sir Wilfrid and Mr. Borjen, and that the understanding reached be- tween them will be considered by a con- servative caucus which has been called for to night. It is probable that the House will be continued in session during the absence of Sir Wilfrid and the other mem- bers of the government who have been called to the conference and the Corona- tion, but that nothing of a contentious party nature will be taken up except reci- procity, the debate upon which will be continued until finally disposed of. This looks like an all summer session of the House.

It is possible there will be a short ad- journment of the House after the depart- ure of Sir Wilfrid for England. The Western members, both Conservative and Liberal, are very keen for an adjourn- ment. If there is no adjournment, the House will jog along with the business that it has in hand and with the railway legislation that is to come down.

Sir Francois Langelier, Chief Justice, of Quebec, will be appointed to succeed Sir C. A. Pelletier as Lieut. Governor, The appointment will not be made for a few days as the funeral of Lieutenant. Gover- nor Pelletier is being held only to day.

NAVAL PLANS OF PORTUGUESE GOVERNMENT

LISBON, May 3.—Assisted by a naval commission, the provisional government began examining the proposals today of foreign firms to supply naval material and guns for land fortifications and construct- ion of a new arsenal opposite Lisbon.

Though nothing has yet been decided, the probabilities are that the contract will be given to British firms. The total cost is estimated at \$150,000,000. The government desires to pay it in fifty years in yearly instalments.

RELIGIOUS RIOTS AT JERUSALEM

JERUSALEM, Palestine, May 3.—The inhabitants have been aroused to the point of rioting by the operations of a party of English archaeologists, who are accused of having excavated beneath the inviolable Mosque of Omar and removed relics reputed to include the Ark of the Covenant, the Censer and other sacred vessels which belonged to the tribes of Israel. Asemy Bey, the Turkish governor, was mobbed on the streets for supposed complicity in the profanation and hooted as a "pig."

The Mosque has been closed and is close- ly guarded pending the arrival from Con- stantinople of officials of the government who will make an investigation. The ex- pedition worked for two years on a large scale beginning at the village of Siloam, which lies at the southeast end of Jeru- salem on the southern slope of the Mount of Olives overlooking the Valley of Ked- ron and the Pool of Siloam. The explorers are credited with having excavated a pass- age from the Pool of Siloam toward the place where once stood Solomons Temple built in 1012 B. C., pillaged and robbed and finally destroyed by Titus A. D. 70. Failing to reach the relics sought in this manner the explorers, according to the alleged confessions of the guards of the Mosque, bribed the guards, entered the Mosque and after digging on six nights, spirited away the treasures "The where- abouts of which, says an Arab paper, "no one knows except God and these English. Mystery surrounds the expedition whose operations have been of such mag- nitude as to make evident that a large sum of money was invested.
