The narrator is Mr W J Malone one of the visitors from the States who finds in the wilds of Canada advantages, from a holiday point of view, impossible to obtain elsewhere. Mr Malone's writing is full of life and vigor and his narration is brightened by accounts of incidents by no means usual even in exploration trips taken so far afield. PEERS' DAUGHTERS WILL NOT SEE CORONATION

LONDON, May 6.—Owing to the unprecedented large official delegation from the dominions, it has been decided that no peers' daughters can be admitted to the coronation service in Westminster Abbey. Indeed, very few ladies will receive commands to attend. Much disappointment has been expressed in high places. It has been found that after places have been provided for Sir Wilfrid Laurier and other Dominion ministers, the parliamentary delegations, ecclesiastics, provincial premiers and public men of high colonial rank, the number of seats available for other Dominion representatives will be very limited.

The location of seats for Canadians outside the Abbey on one of the government coronation stands is not expected to be fixed for some time. The High Commissioner has pressed in vain for definite information in this regard.

SCOTLAND YARD READY TO CARE FOR CROOKS

London, May 1.—The hundreds of international crooks and grafters who intend visiting London this summer and are hopeful of reaping a bumper harvest during the Coronation time will be annoyed to learn that Scotland Yard has prepared extensive plans for their care and reception.

Every device of the English law will be employed to keep them out of the country and if they should happen to slip in every device to harry and prevent them from doing business will be enforced.

Information which Scotland Yard has received leads it to believe that a perfect locust like swarm of crooks from all lands intend to descend upon London this year. Superintendent F Forest, the head of the criminal department of Scotland Yard, is fully cognizant of the situation and is arranging the most effective disposition of his eight hundred detectives to cope with the unwelcome invasion.

Arrivals at every English port, including Liverpool, Plymouth, Southampton, Fishguard, Dover, Folkestone and others, will be subjected to a scrutiny by experienced detectives from the yard and any recognized crook will be detained and rejected under the alien act. But this port precaution is only the skirmishing line of the campaign, so to speak. A large force of detectives will be set aside to spend their time at the leading hotels and restaurants watching for crooks and harrying them away if no real definite charge can be brought against them. The hotel will be most anxious to cooperate with Scotland Yard, not only prompted by the desire to rid their hostleries of undesirables and to protect their guests, but for their own protection as well as under the English law a hotel that harbors thieves is liable to lose its license.

Periodical raids and round ups will be made at the various night resorts where these criminal petrels are sure to congregates. The section of the metropolitan police act which gives the police power to arrest any one on suspicion of loitering about the streets for the purpose of committing a crime will be rigorously enforced.

Men with records, or known to the police will be generally judged by the English magistrates to be loitering about for no good purpose, unless they can definitely show to the contrary, and be sentenced to three months imprisonment. At the end of that time, under the new alien criminal act, which has been introduced, they will be deported, and if they show their noses again in England a two years' term will be the penalty.

The strike in the pulp mill at St George is still on, but the granite mills, which were closed for a couple of days for want of power, have been enabled to resume operations.

STRUCK ANOTHER GAS GUSHER IN ALBERT

Moncton, May 7.—Another big gas well has been brought in by the Moncton Oil Fields Company at McLatcheys, Albert county, Saturday morning the well borers reported to O P Biggs, manager at Moncton, that at a depth of 1,570 feet well No. 20 showed a strong flow of gas. It is difficult to tell just the capacity of the new well but it is estimated it will yield about 4,000,000 feet a day. Mr Biggs will visit the well Monday and the intention is to bore deeper. The latest well is in the direction of Hillsboro and shows the oil and gas district covers a considerable area.

SAYS HE CAN PROVE M'NAMARA GUILTY.

Montreal May 6.—That proof positive beyond fear of contradiction will be offered to show that J J McNamara, secretary of the Structural Iron Workers of America, directed the operation of the dynamiters who blew up the Los Angeles Times building and committed many other similar outrages, is the declaration of Detective William J Burns, who accomplished the spectacular arrests of the men charged with the act which caused a loss of twenty-one lives. "We can prove McNamara's connection with numerous dynamiting outrages throughout the country, and we can also prove conclusively and certainly that J J McNamara directed these men in their criminal work and paid them for it. Whether or not their friends manage to put me out of the way as they threaten to do, the evidence exists to confront them unanswerably at their trial," Burns declared last night.

WOMAN SUFFRAGE MOVEMENT GROWS

British Suffragettes Are Delighted London, May 6.—The majority in favor of the women's suffrage bill on Friday is greater by 57 votes than that given the second reading of the Shackleton women's suffrage bill in the House of Commons in July. Pressure will be brought to bear on the cabinet to obtain facilities for the passage of the measure. The suffragettes have promised to obtain from militant tactics if the government does not oppose this legislation.

The moving of the second reading of the women's enfranchisement bill in the House of Commons yesterday was celebrated last night at enthusiastic meeting of the suffragettes. Christabel Pankhurst told a crowded gathering at Kensington that they must fill the lobes of Parliament with suffragettes until the bill was carried. They must not shrink from any sort of political pressure. A resolution that the Premier facilitate the enactment of the bill at the current session was carried with acclamation. At another meeting Dr Martin pointed out that the conciliation bill in 1910 passed the second reading by a majority of two to one, whereas the majority yesterday was three to one.
