SEVERELY BURNED

In an effort to save as many as possible of his horses and cattle in the fire in his barn on Wednesday of last week, J M Stevens of Andover, received very severe burns on his arms. As he would release an animal and drive it from the barn the pain-stricken brute would again enter the stable. Even the use of blankets over their heads would not make the horses manageable. In the barn which was burned were two horses, four cattle, one mowing machine, one potato digger, one land roller, two harrows, two single wagons, one sloven wagon, two sets of double harness, two sets of light harness, 200 bushels of oats four tons of fertilizer and a large quantity of hay and potatoes. The loss was estimated at upwards of \$4,000 with insurance amounting to \$22,000, and distributed as follows: \$400 on farm implements \$300 on hay and \$1500 on the barn.

ACADIA SEMINARY STUDENT DIES OF TYPHOID FEVER

Hallfax, May 7—Miss Lockwood, daughter of Dr T C Lockwood, who was attending Acadia Seminary, and who some weeks ago contracted typhoid fever when a number of other pupils also became ill of the disease, died yesterday. Her death is the first fatality from the epidemic. The body will be taken to Lockeport tomorrow for interment.

BANGOR FIRE LOSS ABOUT \$3,000,000; INSURANCE \$1,500,000

Bangor, Me., May 5—State Insurance Commissioner Putnam estimates the loss caused by the fire on Sunday April 30th at \$3,000,000 or less, the insurance is approximately \$1,500,000. The work of relieving the fire sufferers is progressing satisfactorily. Over \$42,000 has been subscribed to the relief fund.
