**A GREAT GIFT FOR PEACE.**

Mr Andrew Carnegie has transferred to  
a board of trustees \$10,000,000 in five per  
cent first mortgage bonds, the revenue from  
which is to be used to hasten the abolition of  
international war, and to establish a lasting  
world wide peace. The trustees—2, in num-  
ber, with senator Root of New York as their  
president—are to have the largest liberty in  
the expenditure of the half million dollars  
annually which the fund will yield. It is in-  
tended that the foundation shall be perpetual;  
and the donor, looking forward to a time  
when the primary purpose of abolishing war  
shall be achieved, provides in his trust deed  
that the revenue shall then be devoted to the  
banishment of "the next most degrading  
evil or evils, the suppression of which would  
most advance the progress, elevation and hap-  
piness of man." Included among the trust-  
tees in whose hands this great fund is placed  
are leading statesmen, diplomatists, lawyers,  
educators, business men and others.—The  
Youth's Companion.

After an all night session the lower house  
of the Spanish Cortes, by a vote of 108 to  
20 passed on Dec 23 the Padlock bill which  
prohibits the establishment of new religious  
congregations in Spain for two years. The  
Premier wound up the fight with an eloquent  
speech disavowing hostility to the religious  
orders but insisting upon their non interfer-  
ence in politics. He also declared that they  
must not be allowed to absorb the industries  
of the country while they escaped taxation.  
The Royal assent has been given the bill.—
