The most im portant of those is the New Brunswick South ern, eighty-seven miles in length, from St John to St Stephen. The other is the St Maurice Valley Railway, seven miles long in Shawinigan district, Quebec.

Tash Kent, Asiatic Russia, Jan 4-A violent earthquake was felt at various points of Russian Turkestan from 4 to 4.30 o'clock this morning. Many buildings were destroy ed and there were a number of fatalities, though the loss of life is not known.

Great fissures opened in the ground. Prac tically all of the stores and residences at Vyerni, the capital of the territory of Semiryethensk, were destroyed or damaged. The city has a population of 23,000. Communication in the disturbed district is interrupted

Spokane, Wash., Jan 4-In the Northern Pacific yards in Cheney early today, the North Coast Limited No 2, struck the rear car of the Burlington passenger train, No 42, eastbound. Three coaches were wrecked. Four trainmen are believed to have been killed and a number of trainmen and passen gers are reported seriously hurt.

The Railway Commission, sitting at Ot tawa has directed the express companies of the Dominion to file lower tariff rates within three months. The commission declares that express rates are to high and that as the express companies are owned by the rall way companies there is no occasion for the existence of separate companies to handle the express business. A rate reduciton of at least 10 percent in through express traffic is ordered local rates to be correspondingly cut. -The Youths Companion.


