The cookee of the camp 'Teddy Hezel' of Tracey's Mills, who was 19 years and 313 days in the British army spoke up and asked me the date, then he told me he was on that shi, 1100 of the men were landed. It was in c esting indeed for me to have read in Mun sey's Magazine a part of the history of a man right with me in camp.

I learn this a m with deep regret of the death and burial of Colonel Hartley. He will be greatly missed over a wide area. He was one the most genteel men one could meet. He was an ardent Orangeman, he was one who couldn't be surpassed perhaps in conduc ting a funeral, the propriety and courtesy, he displayed were truly impressive, and he was an enthusiast as Sunday School Superintend ent. How his soul glowed as he gave lessons from the Sunday School passage for the day, One of his most earnest talks of this sort I heard him give at the Methodist S School, East Florenceville not long ago. I unite with so many others in sympathy with Mrs Hartley in this hour of loneliness.

I also learn that John Adair, of Mount Pleasant, passed away, aged about 80 years. A year and three months ago, his wife passed on before, ofter they had lived together more than half a century. Ever since her death it seems Mr Adair had declined in vigor.

#### JOSIAH LINT

Joshiah Lint, who for the last 40 years has been a well known and respected resi dent of Gibson and Marysville, died last evening at the advanced age of 87 years. The deceased who was well and favorably known throughout York county, joined the Free Baptist Church at Bear Island when a young man and was a consistent member of that denomination ever since.
