## MORE LIQUOR FOUND

Mr Colpitts, the Scott Act Inspector, after making a number of searches within the last few weeks at the Boundary line on the road leading from Woodstock to Houlton, suspected that intoxicating liquor was kept in a cellar on the American side of the line. He notified the American officers to meet him at the line on Friday afternoon last. The Sheriff of Aroostook county with his Deputy and Mr Colpitts arrived there at the same time and a quantity of intoxicating liquor was found there on the American side. Alonzo Rackliffe, an old offender against the Scott Act and against whom convictions are now standing on this side, was found in the den, in charge of the place. The liquor was Canadian liquor smuggled across the line and the American officers took charge of Rackliffe for mugging. He will no doubt serve a term in Portland gaol.

Owing to the recent death of the bride's brother, Mr Henry Page Dennis, the wedding will be quiet and will be attended only by the immediate relatives of the bride and groom.—New York Paper.

## TUESDAY MORNING FIRE.

A fire broke out shortly before four o'clock Tuesday morning in the saw mill owned by Albert Hayden and, notwithstanding the strenuous work of the firemen, the mill was completely destroyed and the flames spread to the woodworking factory also owned by Mr Hayden which was partly burned. About 8 years ago the mill was destroyed by fire this being the fourth time it has met with disaster.

The machinery could not be removed. A large quantity of lumber ready for shipment was destroyed. Mr Hayden carried no insurance, as the rate of insurance is very high and the extra cost of a watchman, it is claimed, would enable the proprietor to build a mill every ten years. Between thirty and forty men were employed.

It is expected that the mill will be rebuilt at once. The loss will be well up to \$40,000.
