TOWN COUNCIL.

The regular meeting of the Town Council was held on Friday night. Those present were Mayor Ketchum and Couns Ga lagher, Bailey, Dibblee, Gibson.

finance committee and ordered paid.

Coun Gibson presented a bill of \$23.50

from Wm Gallagher for wood. The mayor said there was a standing rule not to consider bills presented at the Friday

After a satisfactory explanation from Coun Gibson, the bill was referred to the finance and audit committee, and upon the commit tee certifying to its correctness it was order

The mayor sasted that the treasurer, H W Bourne, was sick, and he had learned that the annual premium on his guaranteed bonds of \$4000, falls due in March. The amount, \$16, was always paid by the town.

Coun Gallaghers said that treasurer salary was larger now than when the town firet agreed to pay the bonds and he did not think the town had any right to continue the pay

The clerk said that the matter had been discussed at previous meetings and it was decided by former councils that it were bet er to pay the bond in a guarantee company han have local men go upon the bonds. In case of default by any official there would be no sympathy in collecting from a guarantee company, when there would be if local men were on the bonds.

Coun Dibblee said that Mr Bourne had lots of work for a small salary and there should be no hesitation on the part of the council to pay the bond.

The matter then dropped, to be taken up at a meeting of the full board.

Coun Gallagher pointed out that by the removing the phone from the driver's house on the Houlton road, there was no w y of ing upon each one getting in touch with the fire department in case of fire. There were a number of build ings in that district. There was a private phone at JA Lindsay's but the nearest fire. alarm was at the house of T L McCaffety, near the Broadway School.

Petition from H W Scovil was read from the chalr, Moved by Couns Bailey and Galla gher and passed that the communic tion of Mr Scovil stating that he was over the age limit and asking for refund of taxes be referred te finance committee.

The mayor asked if the chairman of streets had any further information in the matter of permanent streets.

Coun Gallagher said he had written to St John and Fredericton on the subject, and ex mayor Balmain promised to give him some communications he had appropos to the mat ter. It was the intention before making any definite move for the mayor and council to drive to Houlton and get the information what it costs by yard for making improved

A petition was received from the resi dents of St John street, stating that the water supply was out of commission caus ed by the small pipe used and requesting that when making out the estimates, suf ficient funds be voted for a larger pipe. It was signed by Warden Stevens and oth ers. The petition was referred to water

The clerk read the bill he has prepared for the Legislature in the matter of bor rowing \$10,000 for permanent streets.

Moved by Couns Gallagher and Bailey and passed that the bill as read be adopt ed and that the mayor and clerk be auth orized to prepare the necessary petition, and have the bill printed and forwarded to the Legislature.

Coun Bailey asked what contracta are now running between the officials and

The clerk said there were no contracts. The engineer and driver were hired by the month and the time for the superin tendent expired next September.

The mayor said that it appeared that an agreement was made with the Bank of Montreal, the towns bankers, that unless a notice was given in February to termin ate the contract, that it would continue year by year. No such notice had been given consequently the bank account would be continued with that institution for the present year.

Coun Gallagher thought that a special meeting of the council should be called next week to meet with the assessors and get out the estimates early. He said that at least 75 names would be added to the siding.
