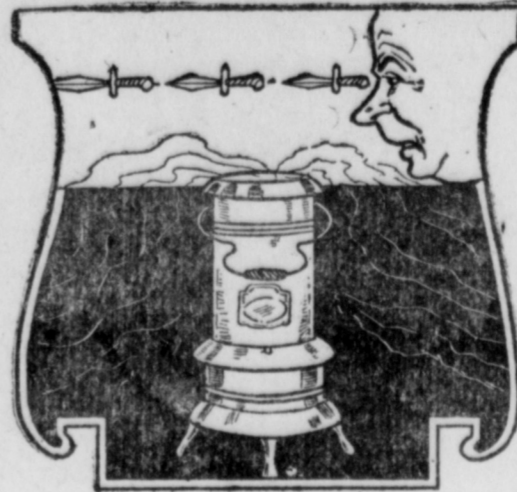
Plaster Rock
