THE BELTLESS SKIRT.

The high waisted skirt is a feature of the new fashions. It is an admirable way to cut a skirt if done in the right way. These skirts can be so managed that they are becoming to every kind of figure.

The way to arrange a high waisted skirt so that they hang correctly as so mount them on a wire in the girdle of belting. The shop sell this in the necessary colors and widths. It is fitted in to the normal waist line at the sides by small darts, which keep it from slipping down. It is fastened separately from the skirt, with hooks and eyes, and holds the skirt securely by being stitched to it at the upper edge.

This artificial waist line may be entirely straight around the figure, or it may be curved down at front and sides to give a better shape. It must not be too high; that is not the intention of the designer. It must merely cover a normal waist line in order to prevent a curve between the arm's eye and the hips. One must be straight over the waist if one is to follow the fashions even from afar.

PULP AND PAPER PROJECT

A new company is being floated by Messrs Donald Fraser and son, of Fredericton, to handle the Messrs Jas Murchie's Sons Company property in the vicinity of Edmundston recently purchased for \$342,000, the object being to conduct a pulp manufacturing business with the possibility of eventually branching out into the paper manufacturing business as well. In the Royal Gazette notice is given that application will be made at the present session of the Legislature for an act for the incorporation of Messrs Frasers, Ltd for the purpose of carrying on a pulp and paper and lumbering business and with all the necessary rights in connection with that business. The capital stock of the company is to be \$250,000, with the right on the approval of two thirds in value of the shareholders, to increase the capital to \$1,000,000.

THINNING THE FRUIT.

IN ORDER TO GET AN ANNUAL CROP

The tendency of all fruit trees is to over bear, or to produce a large amount of seeds. The result of this heavy seed production, especially on apple trees, is to cause trees to bear heavy crops every other year. A fruit spur cannot produce fruit and a fruit bud the same year. It follows, then, that if all the fruit spurs on a tree are producing fruit no fruit buds will be formed that year and no fruit will be produced the following season. If however apples are picked from one half the fruit spurs fruit buds will form on those spurs that year while the other half of the fruit spurs are producing apples. This condition would result in the production of fruit every year. The heavy production of fruit and seeds results in a lessened vigor of the tree as much vitality goes into the production of seeds.

It follows then that if one half the apples are removed thus removing half the seeds, the tree will make a more vigorous growth. When all the fruit spurs on a tree bear fruit a large number of fruits are grown, but they are often so small that they have little or no commercial value. The result of thinning is to produce a smaller number of fruits and to cause each fruit to grow larger thus increasing its commercial value. The effect of thinning is to cause annual bearing to increase the vigor of the trees and to produce more commercial apples. Thinning should be done as early in the spring as the number of fruits that are likely to set can be determined. A natural thinning usually takes place in June, and after that time if the grower finds too many fruits the superfluous ones can be removed.

If possible the thinning should be done before the seeds form and when the apples are about the size of hazel nuts. It frequently happens that from one half to three fourths of the apples should be removed in the spring. The number however depends upon the number of fruits which set or form. Thinning should be so done that only one apple is left on each spur and spaced not nearer to gether than four or five inches.

GENERAL NEWS

Only one member of the New Zealand parliament has offered to go to the Coronation of the King, so the government has declined the invitation of the British parliament.

Mr Asquith has started in to even up the political complexion of the Upper House, and the first new peer to be created is his brother in law, Sir Edward Priaulx Tennant, whose elevation was announced Friday. As a Liberal, he represented Salisbury in Parliament from 1906 to 1910 being defeated in the latter years.

So, amidst the importance attached to irrigation in certain parts of the United States may be obtained from the magnitude and cost of a new dam on the Rio Grand, about a hundred miles north of El Paso. From the Gulf of Mexico up to that city the river forms the boundary between Mexico and the State of Texas. At that point the boundary line runs westward and away from the Rio Grande. The dam, on which work has already been commenced is therefore well within the State of New Mexico. It will be 1,400 feet long and 265 feet high, and will flood 48,000 acres with water 62 feet deep on the average. The intention is to irrigate 180,000 acres.—Toronto Globe.

Lobby reports regarding British cabinet changes arising from the illness of the Earl of Crewe, include the promotion of Mr Haldane to the peerage and possibly Mr Reginald McKenna, First Lord of the Admiralty in order to strengthen the representation of the government in the House of Lords.
