JUBILEE OF THE ABOLITION OF SERFDOM.

One of the world's great monarchs of all time was Alexander II. of Russia, grandfather of the present Czar, Nicholas 11. His greatest achievement was the abolition of serfdom, which began in 1858 with the emancipation of the serfs on the estates of the Imperial family, and ended with the ukase issued on the third of March, 1861. Unfortunately neither the personal popularity of Alexander with the Russian masses, among whom he moved about with little provision for his personal safety, nor the magnitude of the humanitarian service he rendered not merely to the Russian nation, but to the world at large, could protect him against the





The result of this heavy seed peduction, es pecially on apple trees, is to cause trees to bear heavy crops every other year. A fruit spur cannot produce fruit and a fruit bud the same year. missile which caused his death in 1881. The manner in which the ubilee of the abolition of serfdom was celebrated three days ago throughout the Empire shows that the memory of the reforming Czar is quite safe with the Russian people.

Prior to 1861 by far the greater part of Russia in Europe was held in large estates worked by serfs, who were in most cases kept in a condition of virtual slavery. Serfs who had been kept in domestic service, and not ttached to the land, were set free without any right to property; serfs who had been attached to estates vere by a State loan enabled to purhase part of their landlord's interest n their lands. The freedmen thus ecame peasant proprietors, the land being held by the village communties and by them assigned to individal members. Other reforms were intituted at the same time, and these ave been developing ever since.

This brief statement will make ear the nature of the further reform hich the present Czar has announ d his intention to carry out as a uel to that effected by his grandther half a century ago. The lat r freed the serf from his landlord's introl, but it left him bound up with s village community; Nicholas has oclaimed his purpose to afford facties for the peasant proprietors to ave their respective communes, and s intention to make provision for eir agricultural education. There room under these plans for a great provement in the social and polit condition of the of the Russian ople, and the persistence with which present Emperor has stuck to his termination to make The Hague ibunal and the Russian Parliament access augurs well for the gradual, not rapid, development of the Rusm peasantry. He could have chosen better no better way to commenorhis illustrious grandfather,-Torto Globe.



The result of thinning is to produce a smaller number of fruits and to cause each fruit to grow larger thus creas ing its commercial value. The effect of thinn ing is to cause annual bearing to incresse the vigor of the trees and to produce more com fight is being made in Australia said that the mercial apples. Thinning should be done as early in the spring as the number of fruits that are likely to set can be determined. A natural thinning usual takes place in June, many fruits the superflous ones can be 10 moued.

If possible the thinning should be done be fore the seeds form and when the apples are about the size of hazel nuts. From the Gulf of Mexico up to that city the river forms the boundary between Mexico and the State of Texas. At that point the boundary line runs westward and away from the Rio Grande. The dam, on which work has already been commenced is therefore well within the State of New Mexico. 
