Soft Cheese making in the Home, and Milk testing with which are included lectures upon the Care of Dairy Animals, embracing the prevention and cure of diseases, and information as to feeding, etc.

These courses are free to all residents of the Maritime Provinces and provision is made for ladies, who are especially invited.

The Intercolonial Railway give a round trip to and from the School at Single fare on the Standard Certificate plan. The courses conclude on the 31st of March and the two weeks course in Factory Cheese making begins on the 4th of April.
