### REV JOHN PERRY

At Florenceville, Carleton County, N B, on Wednesday, May 24th of diabetis, Rev John Perry, aged 90 years passed peace fully away after over a year's suffering. He died trusting in the merits of Christ and his last words were Tell everybody I die in faith believing in the attonement. He was the sixth son of Will'am and Joicy Alward Perry. He was born May 14, 1821 at Washademoak Lake, Queens Councy, N B. He was convert ed when nine years old and was baptised in the year 1840 by the Rev Mr Mersereau, as ter which he felt it his duty to go and preach the gospel to sinners. He was ordained two years later 1842, by the Rav Mesers Joseph Noble, Sr. Merserean and Flanders and joir. ed the Free Christian Baptist Idenomination. He was an earnest and arduous worker for the cause he loved and gave all his energies and talent in helping others to live a christ ian life. His labours were blest in that he was the means in God's hands of converting baptizing and joining to the different church es of which he was pastor upwards of one thousands souls. He was a strong advocate of temperance and did good work in lectur ing on that question as opportunity ofiered. In politics he was a staunch [liberal all his life. In his younger days and past middle life he took an active interest in everything that was for the betterment of the country in which he lived and the education of the

In 1844 he married Catherine, daughter of sames and Amy Alward Toole of Kare, Kings County. To them were born six child ren. Edward W, M D, of providence, RI James T. deceased, Joicy, wife of Byron C place. Shaw of Victoria, Carleton Connty; Amy, wife of H P Birmingham, of Victoria deceased Annie E, of Florenceville, graduate nurse of the Worcester City Hospital, Mass; and John N of Connell, Carleton County. He had seven grand children and numerous nep hews, nieces and other relative.

In July, 1891, his wife was stricken with appoplexy and paralysis of the right side of which she never recovered. She was a great sufferer but always looking forward to the re ward which was here at the end of life's jour ney. On March 7th, 1892, she passed peace fully away with her daughters at her bedside She was 71 years old.

The foueral took place on Friday at Victoria Corner.

## Baseball League Plans Announced.

FREDERICTON. May 27.-The New Brunswick and Maine baseball league season will open on Tuesday, June 6th, when all x teams in the organization will play their opening games. Last night a meeting of the executive of the league was held at the Barker House, the object being to make up the league schedule. The meeting worked on the proposition for some time and finally adopted a schedule for the first two weeks of the season and decided to place the making of the rest of the schedule in the hands of a Montreal expert.

With the season due to run to the last of August, or possibly until about September 10th, none of the clubs will be premitted to import any players after August 5th, thus stopping wholesale importations of stars for the final games of the season. Every club must forward to the secretary of the league a complete list of players under contract on August 5th, and after that time there can be no more importations.
