### REV JOHN PERRY

At Florenceville, Carleton County, N. B., on Wednesday, May 24th of diabetes, Rev John Perry, aged 90 years passed peacefully away after over a year's suffering. He died trusting in the merits of Christ and his last words were Tell everybody I die in faith believing in the atonement. He was the sixth son of William and Joicy Alward Perry. He was born May 14, 1821 at Washademoak Lake, Queens County, N. B. He was converted when nine years old and was baptised in the year 1840 by the Rev Mr Mersereau, after which he felt it his duty to go and preach the gospel to sinners. He was ordained two years later 1842, by the Rev Messrs Joseph Noble, Sr, Mersereau and Flanders and joined the Free Christian Baptist denomination. He was an earnest and arduous worker for the cause he loved and gave all his energies and talent in helping others to live a christian life. His labours were blest in that he was the means in God's hands of converting baptizing and joining to the different churches of which he was pastor upwards of one thousand souls. He was a strong advocate of temperance and did good work in lecturing on that question as opportunity offered. In politics he was a staunch liberal all his life. In his younger days and past middle life he took an active interest in everything that was for the betterment of the country in which he lived and the education of the young.

In 1844 he married Catherine, daughter of James and Amy Alward Tools of Kere, Kings County. To them were born six children. Edward W, M D, of providence, R I James T, deceased, Joicy, wife of Byron C Shaw of Victoria, Carleton County; Amy, wife of H P Birmingham, of Victoria deceased Annie E, of Florenceville, graduate nurse of the Worcester City Hospital, Mass; and John N of Connell, Carleton County. He had seven grand children and numerous nephews, nieces and other relatives.

In July, 1891, his wife was stricken with apoplexy and paralysis of the right side of which she never recovered. She was a great sufferer but always looking forward to the reward which was hers at the end of life's journey. On March 7th, 1892, she passed peacefully away with her daughters at her bedside. She was 71 years old.

The funeral took place on Friday at Victoria Corner.

### Baseball League Plans Announced.

FREDERICTON, May 27.—The New Brunswick and Maine baseball league season will open on Tuesday, June 6th, when all six teams in the organization will play their opening games. Last night a meeting of the executive of the league was held at the Barker House, the object being to make up the league schedule. The meeting worked on the proposition for some time and finally adopted a schedule for the first two weeks of the season and decided to place the making of the rest of the schedule in the hands of a Montreal expert.

With the season due to run to the last of August, or possibly until about September 10th, none of the clubs will be permitted to import any players after August 5th, thus stopping wholesale importations of stars for the final games of the season. Every club must forward to the secretary of the league a complete list of players under contract on August 5th, and after that time there can be no more importations.

The schedule for the first two weeks of the league follows:—Tuesday June 6 St. John and Marathons, at St. John; Fredericton and Woodstock, at Woodstock; St. Stephen and Calias, at Calias; Thursday, June 8th, St. John and Calias at Calias; Marathons and Woodstock at St. John; Fredericton and St. Stephen at Fredericton. Friday June 9th, Woodstock and Calias at Woodstock; Saturday, June 10th, St. John and St. Stephen at St. Stephen. Marathons and Fredericton at St. John. Tuesday, June 13th, St. John and Fredericton at St. John; Marathons and Calias at Calias; Woodstock and St. Stephen at Woodstock; Thursday June 15th, St. John and Woodstock at St. John; Marathons and St. Stephen at St. Stephen; Fredericton and Calias at Fredericton. Saturday June 17th, St. John and Marathons at St. John; St. Stephen and Calias at St. Stephen; Monday, June 19th, Fredericton and Woodstock at Woodstock.

The St John Marathons will play here on Wednesday May 31 and the Fredericton team will play at St John in a double header on Saturday June 3 the King's birthday. First Baseman Pat Duggan, who has been loaned to the local club by the Lowell New England League club, has been appointed manager of the Fredericton team.
