SERIOUS FIRE

Shortly after noon on Sunday fire caught from a defective flue in the office of the Woodstock Woodworking Company which is close to the factory. The office and warehouse were completely destroyed together with a stock of mouldings, sashes and doors valued at \$4000. The building was insured for \$200 and the stock for \$800.
