Sir Richard Cartwright has before the Senate a very important bil for the regula tion and verification of grain as it goes through the elevators. There is, apparently, a good deal of trickery in the business, and grain is, it is alleged, metamorphosed in con veyance to ship ing points. Sir Richard's measure puts penalties and restrictions upon the wicked deeds of those who indulge in this kind of business. After a sharp fight in the Sarata he consented to refer two clauses of his measure to a special committee. That committee was unfortunately composed of a majority of men averse from the legis lation. They have submitted two reports. The minority sustains Sir Richard's measure. The majori'y modifies it in the interest of the elevator people. The reports are to be considered by the Senate on the 20th fastant, and there will be a vigorous contest over the matter. -St John Globe.
