

## NEW ZEALAND AS A GAME PRESERVE;

New Zealand bids fair to become an excellent sporting ground when game, has become scarce in other countries. The New Zealand Government misses no opportunity of obtaining sporting animals and fish. Its red deer herds are famous for their size and the quality of their antlers. A herd of chamois was sent to New Zealand by the Emperor of Australia. Its herd of wapiti was presented by President Roosevelt. Its thar and Japanese deer were given to the country by the Duke of Bedford and Mr Lucas of Warnham Court Surrey has also made complimentary donations of red deer from its well known herds. The Government has recently purchased a herd of moose from Saskatchewan, in Canada which was landed without mishap and has been turned out in the magnificent forests on the west coast of the South Island.

## THE OLD COURT AND THE NEW

Much as they loved King Edward, the English people recognize that a man of a very different type may be equally worthy of their affection. Edward VII loved society for its own sake; it is no secret that George V does not. Like his father, he is a keen sportsman and a hard worker but possesses less of that superfluous energy which made the late King throw himself with the same zest in to the social as into the more serious side of life.

Queen Mary is essentially a mother. It will perhaps be impossible for her to be as much in the public eye from

a merely social point of view as was Queen Alexandra, who came to the throne when the more absorbing side of her domestic duties may be said to have been at an end. But it was as the devoted mother while Princess of Wales that Alexandra gained that deep hold on the affections of the English people which she has never lost.

As Queen and mother, Mary will probably follow in her footsteps. With the smarter element of society she may not be entirely popular, but that element is not important. This much is assured, that for one reason or another various well known, or at least much talked of people whose names were familiar at King Edward's court will not be seen at King George's, and that some of them have already received plain intimation of the fact.

**C. Louis Tartlets.**—One large cupful of seeded chopped raisins or candied cherries, the juice and grated rind of one lemon, the whites of two eggs, and a pinch of salt. Mix together well, and put some of the mixture on rounds of pie crust from six to seven inches in diameter, and fold together from three sides, so that the shape will resemble a triangle. Press the edges firmly together to hold the mixture in well, put into a baking pan, brush over with a little sweetened milk and bake a nice brown.

## VEILED EFFECTS IN BLOUSES.

The blouse must still match the costume, or at least harmonize in color. Chiffon is the most important of the blouse materials while marquisette nets and various supple silken stuffs help. The fad for veiled effects is particularly dominant and the majority of the fancy blouses are entirely or partially veiled with chiffon.

Many of the smartest are of extreme simplicity, the veiling net being used quite plainly with body and sleeves frequently cut in one after the prevailing fashion.

Persian chiffon or silk under plain chiffon is much used and there are innumerable smart blouses in which plain color veils a foundation of chiffon in white or some contrasting color elaborately trimmed in lace or embroidery. The effect of the ornamentation softened by the veiling is a most happy one.

A very handsome waist is made of a soft, but brilliant Persian silk veiled by a single thickness of black chiffon and trimmed with narrow borders of the silk.

## GENERAL NEWS

Harvard University has grown beyond her financial resources. The deficit for last year exceeded \$50,000.

Hon Stanforth Smith administrator of Papua in New Guinea two of his staff and a number of friendly natives have been killed by hostile tribesmen.

Prince Leopold of Battenberg second son of Princes Henry and the favorite brother of the Queen of Spain is seriously ill at Sydney N S W. The cause of his illness has not been diagnosed.

By a vote of 15 to 14 the Maine Senate on Tuesday voted to accept the unfavorable minority report of the committee on legal affairs upon the bill to provide a registration board for osteopaths.

The British Association of Chambers of Commerce is making representations to the Colonial Office in regard to the conduct of certain of the provinces of Canada which impose taxes on commercial travellers.

There were 7,096 warrants for land issued by the Department of the Interior to South African War veterans according to a return to the House of Commons. Of the total on 1584 were used by the men whose names they bore to secure land. So far 4,408 were sold to other parties to secure money.

The fire loss of the United States and Canada for January 1911 as compiled by the New York Journal of Commerce shows an aggregate of \$21,922,450. In January 1910 the losses were \$15,175,400. The January fire loss in Canada alone according to the carefully compiled figures of the Monetary Times was \$2,250,550 as compared with \$1,275,246 last year and \$1,500,000 in January 1909.
