Temple

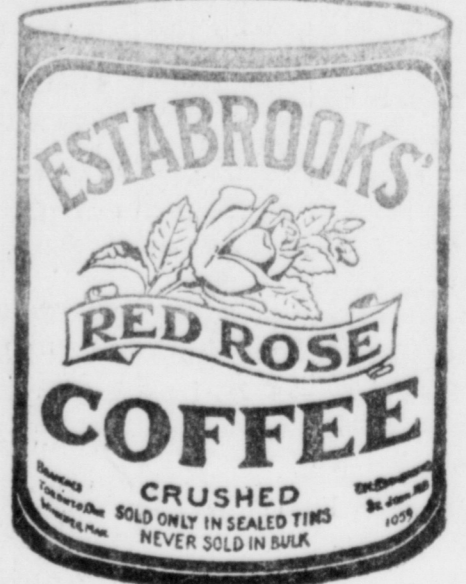
Weather continues pleasant and Friday 24th ult was a very suitable day to rule the weather for March if the old weather prediction the last Friday of the month rules the following be true.

BREAD RIOTS IN PLAGUE DISTRICT ICE FLOE DISASTER

ST PETERSBURG, Feb 28.—Pei Chua but 23, about fifty miles north of Harbin, is being ravaged by the plague. The deaths there are reported to number 2,000 daily.
The disease is raging at Kirin, Hulanchon opposite Harbin, and at Bodune, one hundred miles southeast of Harbin. Bread riots have occurred throughout this district. The foreign consuls are preparing to leave. Troops have refused to march into the plague places and martial law has been established. The Chinese Emperor has reprimanded the Manchurian authorities for not having dealt more energetically with the situation. The Far Eastern press is filled with apprehensions of a recrudescence of boxerism.
According to the official report of the fishing disaster in the Gulf of Finland of the 500 persons who were carried off when the ice broke from the shore and drifted away, many have been lost. Their cries for help were not heard at the time, but late in the evening the shore watchmen observed the ice floe and ice breakers were sent in pursuit. Three days search proved futile. In the meantime the floe broke into several parts each bearing 40 or 50 persons. In the break up many fell into the water and perished. Two parties, totaling 120 persons, were subsequently driven ashore. None of the remainder have been found.
