HOW FARMERS COULD GET PROFIT ON WOOL BY CAREFUL GRADING
(Canadian Textile Journal)

Wool is the farmers product and there is more profit might be obtained by the farmer from his wool if he would be more careful in the manner in which he sends it to market.

Proper classifying, condition and cleanliness are factors which save annoying work to the buyers, and, when properly looked after in the first instance, bring not only readier saleability, but a premium in price. Even in Australia where the growers may be supposed to be past masters in all the arts pertaining to placing their wool on the market, complaints are made as to carelessness in grading and conditioning. A writer in the Sydney, N S W Stock and Station Journal, gives some instances in illustration of these points. Apart from the fact that it is necessary to separate entirely from each other the different types or styles of wool that are used in each branch of the manufacturing industry, the greatest factor in the price per pound paid for wool, is condition. By condition is meant the yield or grease which all wool contains in a greater or less degree, together with more or less sand or earth. One of the greatest faults in present day classing is neglect or ignorance of the all-important point, which will pay handsomely in results for any time and attention devoted to mastering it.

Suppose a particular lot of wool catches the buyer's attention, and, as he believes it will just fit his requirements, he is prepared to give even an extra cent per pound. On further examination however, and probing deeper into the bales, he finds a fleece which, though it may be good in quality and staple is lacking in condition, compared with those he first saw. He has to revise his estimate of the probable yield and true value of the lot, with the result that he makes his offer nearer to the basis of the poorer stuff. If the lot had been classed properly, the seller would have received a high price for the really good fleeces and a moderate price for the others, instead of which he has to sell the whole at the valuation of the latter. Just in the same way, the apple grower who packs Nos 1 and 2 together, receives a No 2 price.

RAYMOND CLOWES

Andover, N B, May 19—The death of Raymond Clowes, from typhoid fever, occurred at his home in Perth, on Tuesday, May 16, after an illness of nine weeks. He was in his 22nd year, and was the fourth son of George and Charlotte Clowes. Interment was made on Friday in the Methodist burying ground the Rev Mr Ives officiating. The Independent Order of Foresters, of which he was a member marched in a body, headed by the 67th Regiment band.

TURKEY RULER BADLY SCARED

CONSTANTINOPLE, May 20.—The Sultan was badly scared yesterday while driving at Selank, Fifteen Kurds rushed out of the crowd, shouting wildly, while one of them made a dash for the royal carriage. The Sultan arose in alarm and fell back faintly. The commander of the escort spurred his horse and cut off the approach of the advancing Kurd. The horse fell and the confusion was increased. The Kurds were all arrested.

ST PETERSBURG, May 20.—The Duma has authorized the expenditure of \$150,000, 000 for the re organization of the fleet. The programme includes four Dreadnoughts and six submarines for the Black Sea and four Dreadnoughts for the Baltic, in addition to four battleships which will be launched in July. A small island at the mouth of the River Neva is to be transferred to the admiralty for a new dockyard.

LONDON, May 20.—The members of the Royal Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals decided last night to ask Lord Cromer to resign the vice presidency of the organization because he upholds vivisection. Lady Pender said that the fact that Lord Cromer was vice president caused many persons to refuse to identify themselves with the society, and thus a considerable sum or money was lost.

MANY VILLAGES WIPED OUT

Tokio, May 20—Forest fires in Hok Kado, the northernmost of the islands of Japan are devastating a vast territory of the land. A number of villages already have been destroyed. The troops have been called out and every available man is fighting the flames. The fire line is almost sixty miles in length. It is impossible this afternoon to estimate the number of fatalities or the amount of damage resulting from the conflagration.

EXCESSIVE CABLE RATES

London, May 20—It is understood that the existing cable rates which are still considered excessive, will come up for consideration at the Imperial Conference which meets next week. Premier Fisher of Australia, and Premier Ward of New Zealand are both expected to have the subject brought up.

Mr Honiker Heston, the veteran postal reformer and former member for Canterbury describes the present rates as a sin from an Imperial point of view.

The Canadian Coronation Arch and trophy are being erected in Whitehall instead of the Strand as originally proposed.

The government of the Netherlands has abrogated the decree of expulsion against Mr Tinsley, the Rutter dam representative of the Uranium Steamship Company which is controlled by the Canadian Northern.

Further details as to the coming coronation Shakespeare ball state that the decorations of Albert Hall on that occasion will represent a Tudor garden the boxes being bowers with clippey yews and grapevines while the balcony will represent a grass terrace with cypress trees; twenty-five feet high. The band will play on a stage lawn while the roof will have an awning representing the blue sky and the lighting will convey the impression as far as possible of sunlight. Evidently even the ball arrangements have received a touch of imagination in connection with Shakespeare's name.
