#### IN THE FAR NORTH LAND

Dominion Government will Establish Experimental Farms on Mackenzie River,

Edmonton, Alta., May 10—The stage which leaves for Athabasca Landing today carried among the passenger C. Card and A J Bell, formerly of Guelph and Prince Albert respectively, who will plant and maintain for years to come along the lonely shores of Mackenzie River, the most northerly demonstrations farms of the Dominion Government. Bell will be stationed at Fort Smith which lies on the line of the northern boundary of the Province of Alberta, while Mr Card's lot will be east in with Fort Simpson on the Mackenzie, at one time the head quarters of the Hudson Bay Company for the whole north country.

These two points were chosen as best adapted for location of farms for demonstration for agricultural possibilities of Canada's hinterland and at the same time to hold up to northern Indians the manner of life lived by men in civilized communities. For this reason the farms are to be more or less under the Department of Indian affairs. The establishment of these farms is the direct outcome of the visit of Hon Mr Oliver to sub Arctic Canada during the past summer.

James McEvoy, Toronto, and R G Dryman, Vancouver, are in Edmonton gathering together a prospecting party for a summer's work in the coal area of Jasper Park Brule Lake. McEvoy was for many years with the Geological Survey Branch of the Dominion Government, and twelve years ago made the first survey through Jasper Pass. He later joined the Crows Nest Pass Coal Company and with Mr Dryman was associated for a number of years as chief engineer. They are now both acting as representatives of Toronto capitalists interested in the development of the Jasper Park coal area.
