IN THE FAR NORTH LAND

Dominion Government will Establish Experi mental Farms on Mackenzie River,

Edmonton, Alta., May 10-The stage which leaves for Athabasca Landing today carried among the passenger C. Card and A. J Bell, formerly of Guelph and Prince A bert respectively, who will plant and main tain for years to come along the lonely shores of Mackenzie River, the most northerly d monstrations farms of the Dominion Govern ment. Bell will be stationed at Fort Smith which lies on the line of the northern bound ary of the Province of Alberta, while Mr Card's 1 t will be cast in with Fort Simpson on the Mackenzie, at one time the head quarters of the Hudson Bay Company for he whole north country.

These two points were chosen as best adapt ed for location of farms for demonstration for agricultural possibilities of Canada's hint erland and at the same time to hold up to northern Indians the manner of life lived by men in civilized communities. For this reas on the farms are to be more or less under the Department of Indian affairs. The estab li-hment of these farms is the direct out come of the visit of Hon Mr Oliver to sub Arctic Canada during the past summer.
