FIVE LIVES LOST IN ST JOHN RIVER

Elmundston, N B May2-The saddest acci dent in the history of Edmunston happened here last night, by which five lives were lost The wire used in running the ferry between th's place and Madawaska, Maine, broke when the boat was in the middle of the river and the boat upset and all but one of its occu pants were drowned. The river is running high and is icy cold. so that those thrown in to the water had little chance to help them selves. Those drowned are; Solomon Hebert aged 22, and Calixte Dufour, 40, of St David Maine; Allan Phillips, aged 15, son of H W Phillips, CPR, station agent here; Isidore Moscovicz, 14 years old, son of Joseph Mos covicz, merchant, and a middle aged man whose name cannot be learned.

Zaphirin Daigle, who was in charge of the boat, was saved, but was unconscious when brought ashore.

A boat with several men started out as soon as the accident was noticed, but the current was two swift for them to over take, those struggling in the water.

Mrs Phillips was watching the boat in which her son was coming across the river, and the boy had waved a signal to her just before the wire rope broke. Much sympathy is felt for the families of the deceased, espec ially for those of the two young boys
