CARLETON CIRCUIT COURT

The April sitting of the Circuit Court opened here on Tuesday, His Honor Judge Barry presiding. In his opening address to the grand jury His Honor congratulated it upon the absence of criminal business. He also eulogized the public buildings.

STEWART VS IMPERIAL PACKING CO.

The first case Abner Stewart vs The Imperial Packing Company, continued until Friday morning. Hon W P Jones for plaintiff vs. A E Connell, K C for defendant. Mr Stewart sued for \$800 which he claimed was due him for logs supplied the company.

At 2 o'clock on Friday morning the jury brought in a verdict for Stewart for \$86.46. The jurymen were Manzer Colwell, Alex Bell W O Cluff, Allan DeLong, Watts Tompkins P Bradish and John Colter.

The case of John W Bohan against the Toronto Construction Co., which commenced on Friday was settled by a conference between the parties yesterday.

Mr Bohan furnished 70,000 railway ties for use in building the National Transcontinental Railway, for which part payment was made by the Toronto Construction Co., leaving an alleged balance of \$3,016.46.

The company claimed that they owed plaintiff about \$500. Whilst the terms of the settlement have not been made public the general opinion is that Mr Bohan got about all he entered suit for. Hon W P Jones was attorney for plaintiff and A J Gregory for the defendant, and the jury was Alex Ritchie, T C Cain, Stanley Hatfield, Harry Parrington, Cass Nuddin, John McLean and John Fleming.

KING ALFONSO HAS TUBERCULOSIS, SAYS PARIS PAPER

Paris, May 1.—L'Intransigeant claims that King Alfonso is ill of tuberculosis and that a consultation of his physicians decided that urgent measures of treatment were necessary and also that the Spanish monarch should pass the coming winter at Lesseins, Switzerland, where the climate is better adapted to his condition.

MILLIONS OF MATCHES BURNED IN HULL FIRE

Ottawa, May 2.—Fire in the stock room of the E B Eddie Co. at Hull to-day destroyed 3,000,000 matches. The blaze is supposed to have originated from spontaneous combustion. The room is constructed of cement and being absolutely fireproof, the matches were allowed to burn themselves out. The loss is not very heavy.

A man named Ferguson, coming here recently from Boston and ostensibly running an upholstering business confessed before Chief Kelly and Customs Officer Bull on Wednesday, that he was really agent for parties in Boston engaged in "White Slave" traffic, and as he was not successful in getting any young girls here to accept a splendid position with his aunt in Boston, he was given a few hours to get across the line, which he gladly accepted.

NEWCASTLE HOTEL UNDER QUARANTINE FOR SMALLPOX

Newcastle, April 29.—The Royal Hotel, where many country people put up, has been quarantined for smallpox, there being two cases, a boarder and the proprietor, Moses Whitney, the latter of whom is seriously ill.

TWO CHURCHES BURNED IN CARLETON COUNTY.

At Waterville on Thursday last fire raged in the dry grass extended to the Methodist church. The building was completely destroyed as was also the Reformed Baptist church across the road. The weather was warm, very dry and a moderate breeze was blowing.

There was intense excitement for some time, a barn caught and although the fire got at the haymow and burned off the roof the bucket brigade put it out. Nine buildings were afire at one time, but all were saved. A great army of men, summoned from all parts by telephone, proved the salvation of the village.

RETURN OF DUDLEY A CONANT

Dudley A Conant of Presque Isle, who suddenly disappeared from that town Monday morning April 17, was found Saturday morning in Patten apparently as well as ever. Mr Conant had seen the notice of a reward for his identification and had suddenly come to a realizing sense that he himself was the man wanted. It seems that Mr Conant suffered something like a mental lapse or temporary aberration of mind and had on the morning of his disappearance walked from Presque Isle to Mapleton. It is said that from there he walked to Astland and thence to Patten, without being recognized by anybody. Some eight years ago the falling of a heavy wrench upon Mr Conant's head injured him considerably, so that many times since he has felt severe pains in the head, and said that if nothing could be done for these pains, he should go crazy. Mr Conant has returned home apparently as well as ever. All are rejoiced to see him, for he is a steady, reliable, very likeable young man with many friends in town.—Fort Fairfield Review

BRITAIN'S BIGGEST CRUISER BATTLE SHIP.

Barrow in Furness, Eng. April 29.—The Princess Royal, the largest cruiser battleship ever built for the British navy, was launched today and christened by Princess Royal Louise, after whom the vessel was named. The Princess Royal displaces 26,350 tons and will have turbine engines of from 70,000 to 75,000 horse power. She is expected to make a speed of thirty knots and will carry eight new 13.5 inch guns in four turrets and so disposed that all can be discharged on either broadside or four ahead and four astern. These great weapons discharge a shell weighing 1,250 pounds and can pierce the best existing armor plate at a distance of six miles.

FIRES IN MAINE DO MUCH DAMAGE

Portland, Me., April 29.—Losses aggregating a quarter of a million dollars resulted from three fires in different parts of the State of Maine yesterday. The heaviest damage was at Fairfield, where the Home and New Hall saw mills, valued at \$150,000, were destroyed, but the most widespread destruction of property was at Harrington, where twenty one buildings, including, twelve dwelling houses, a church, two schools, the town hall and Grange Hall and other buildings went up in flames. The loss there is estimated at \$80,000. At Livarmore Falls, eighteen families were made homeless by a fire.

HEAVY SNOW FALLS IN WESTERN CANADA.

Winnipeg, April 29.—Heavy snow falls from three to seven inches all over Alberta, and farmers are jubilant over the prospects for the season.

It is estimated that over six inches of snow fell, and this being of a heavy nature, will do immense good in moistening the land.

About sixty per cent, of the seeding has been done in Alberta and the land is in excellent shape.

FOREST FIRES ARE RAGING IN RIVER PARISHES OF YORK CO

Forest fires are raging in the sections of the Parishes of Canterbury and Southampton and have already caused the destruction of thousands of dollars worth of property. Several barns one house and a number of head of cattle have been destroyed.

A few days ago at East Waterville Mr Samuel Barrow lost his barn, a horse and all his farm machinery. The flames crossed the field to a barn belonging to Mr Frank Harris, which also went up in smoke.

On Friday night at Dowville while Bruce Hillman was burning some potato stalks in the yard, the flames spread to some straw nearby and then to the barn which was quickly consumed along with seven head of cattle.

At Canterbury Station on Friday Mr Sole Dickinson lost his house, barn, outbuildings, ten head of cattle and a quantity of hay. He only saved a small quantity of household effects.
