

#### AMERICA'S BIG FIRE LOSS

New York, May 11 .- war was declared on all kinds of matches except the safety by the National Board of Fire Vaderwrites, in resolution adopted at a meeting held here to day, when one hundred and thirty-five fire insurance companies were represented. Loui-S Amonson, of Philadeiphia, who introduced the resolution, said the largest proportion of preventable fire; was due to the non safefy match. A resolution was also adopted favor ing laws to punish those who throw away lighted cigars or cigarettes near combustible material. Mr O Brown, chairman of the board, criticized law makers for "medding with business which the fire insurance men are more capable of handling," and added that legislatures would be better engaged adopting legislation to prevnt fires.

The fire loss in the United States last year was \$25,000,000 more than in 1909, and Am erica generally far exceeds Europe in the proportion of fire loss. The per capital loss in the United States last year was \$2.39 in 297 cities, while in France it was 92 cents, and Germany 49 cents.

#### SEPARATION OF CHURCH AND STATE IN PORTUGAL

Lisbon, May 15-A Lisbon newspaper says that according to a communication re ceived from the Vatican, the pope has con ciuded an examination of the seperation law and absolutely condemns it, but as it is not to be enforced until July 1, he will await that date before expressing his opinion offi cially, in the hope that in the interim the un wavering opposition of the Portuguese clergy to the law and their refusal to take stipends may induce the provisional government to al'ar some of its most stringent clauses, es pecially concerning interference by the gov erament with the clergy's canonical rights which wholly appert in to the church.

It is reported that in event of the actual de cree being enforced many churches will be closed and the priesthood will be deprived of all property and reduced to poverty. How ever, it is well known in official circles that the government desires to avoid a rupture wi h the Holy See, as that would tend to aggravate hostilt y on the part of the section of the country which is almost wholly Catho lic, especially in the north, against the gov ernment the forthcoming elections.
