My little water-thrush was picking about in some pretty hard ground. Seemed to be something he wanted there. So I reached out that way very slowly and carefully with my umbrella tip, and stirred the soil ever so little. Some thing caught his eye at once and he was busy round that little hole right off. Then I made another for him pretty close to my foot. What he got out of them was too small for me to see, but it must have been something nice. From the expression of his face I could imagine that he was smacking his lips—or at least whatever it is that birds do to correspond to that act.

And, now, here comes the funny part of the story. Close at hand, indeed almost over head, is a high railway trestle. While he was regaling himself a most on my shoe a big engine rushed by, pouring steam and smoke all over us, and, if you will believe it, the little rascal never so much as blinked but went right on with his scratching and scab- bling as if nothing at all was the matter.

During our next lesson he walked up on the umbrella and waited while a fresh hole was punched for him. And now, instead of walking off when I come to pay my visit, he wylks toward me and waits while I punch him a few more fresh worm-holes. We really are on intimate terms. But unfortunately accident has kept me in the house for a week. I am worried about the little fellow. It has been freezing weather and what if the steam has, for some reason or other been shut off! BIRDS AND INSECT PESTS

Has the destruction of birds in this country anything to do with the marked increase in recent years of all kinds of in- sect pests? We believe it has, though how much, it is hard to say. There are orchard pests, garden pests, shade tree pests, in fact, some kind of liv- ing "critter" for everything that grows. And it is undoubtedly true that these pests were not so plentiful years ago when all kinds of game birds were more num- erous. The passing of the one has been followed by the coming of the other and it is not unreasonable to conclude that there is some relation between them. If so, the man with the gun has a whole lot to account for. For his own pleasure he has wantonly destroyed game birds and every other kind of bird, until in this country, excepting in the newer districts, there is hardly a bit of feathered life to be seen. Where are the pigeons, the quail and many other game birds, that used to be as plentiful as the trees in the forest? All gone, and in their place we have count- less insects and a few more birds of the sparrow type. There are many young peo- ple in the country to day who have never seen a quail. And yet this splendid game bird was to be found by the thousands al- over this land not many years ago.—Cal- adian Farm

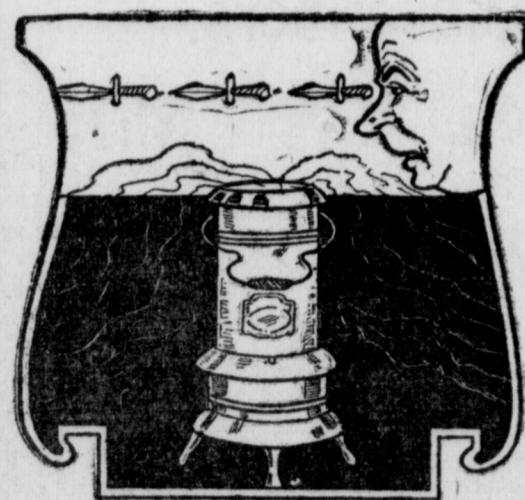
