Last Saturday the 6th a very destructive fire destroyed the residence of Alfred Thompson and Edward Orchard of Orchard Settlement. Mr Thompsons house caught from the burning out of a flue and the sparks from the burning of the Thompson house set the house owned by Edward Orchard, but unoccupied, on fire. Both houses were totally destroyed. They were valued at about \$2,500 with no insurance.

St Johns Episcopal church of Highfield was totally destroyed by fire on Tuesday the 9th fanned by a terrific gale a fire originating on the N B C Ry swept with appalling suddenness and in tensely upon the little barnlet of Highfield. STANDARD OIL TRUST ORDERED TO DISSOLVE.

Washington, May 15—The Supreme Court of the United States today upheld the decision of the Missouri courts ordering the dissolution of the Standard Oil Company of New Jersey. The supreme courts holds that the Standard Oil Company is a monopoly in restraint of trade; that this giant corporation must be dissolved within six months. Corporations whose contracts are not 'unquestionably restrictive of competition' are not affected. Other great corporations whose acts may be called into question will be dealt with according to the merits of their particular cases.

The court was unanimous as to the main features of the decision, Justice Harlan dissenting only as to a limitation of the application of the Sherman anti-trust law. President Taft and cabinet will consider immediately the entire trust situation and the advisability of pressing for federal incorporation act.

The decision in the tobacco case was not handed down today, but is expected on May 29.

FIRE COMMITS RAVAGES IN QUEBEC

ST JOHNS, Que., May 13.—After a night of complete darkness, the electric light plant having fallen a prey to the flames which yesterday afternoon swept the residential section of the town. St Johns to day estimated its loss in the conflagration at \$75,000. Had it not been for the aid given by the Stanbridge brigade, a much larger section of the town would have been destroyed. Nine residences and a factory were burned.

BEDFORD, Que., May 13.—Fire which swept with lightning like rapidity through the town last night, fanned by a fierce wind, left a trail of losses behind estimated to day at \$25,000. Thirteen dwellings, a sash and door factory and several outbuildings were destroyed.

BIG FRUIT CROPS.

Chatham, Ont., May 11.—Prominent Kent apple dealers look for a bumper crop of fruit this year in this district.

There is a good show of bloom for pears cherries and plum trees. They are very heavy, and are now coming out in full bloom. If the weather continues fair and with the wind in the right direction, so that the bees may work, the chances are that fruit will set very heavily. Apples are not yet far enough advanced to make any prophecy, but it is believed there will be a show of apples this year. The acreage of strawberries is not as large this spring on account of the amount of land that is being devoted to tobacco but the plants are coming through nicely, and so are raspberries. Peaches look very good in this vicinity.

SERIOUS FIRES AT GRAND FALLS

Grand Falls, May 12.—Two fires of considerable proportions occurred in this vicinity yesterday. The house and barns of C F Merritt were burned yesterday. The loss to the property is estimated at about \$3,000. There was \$1,000 insurance. Mrs Merritt, who was ill at the time of the fire, having recently undergone an operation, suffered a severe shock.

The house and barn of Daniel Gillispie at Gillispie Settlement, about five miles from this place, were gutted by fire yesterday. The house, with all the furnishings, were destroyed, as were the outbuildings. In the barn were 12 tons of hay, 200 bushels of oats and 10 bushels of fertilizer, all of which were burned. Several up to date machines for farming purposes were stored in the barn and were destroyed by the fire. As there was no insurance the loss is a serious one. It is thought that the fire was a case of incendiarism and certain persons are suspected of the deed.

FATAL ACCIDENT AT NEWBURG.

Louise, the two year old daughter of Thos Hourihan of Newburg, was fatally burned at her home Wednesday evening about 7 o'clock. The child, with an elder sister, was playing in a room upstairs. The elder girl was called away for a few minutes and it is supposed the little girl secured some matches which may have been lying about the room. Mrs Hourihan did not hear any cries but saw smoke coming out of the window and called to her husband, who ran upstairs, fearing that the room was afire. When he arrived upstairs he found the little body of the child lying face downward between the bed and the wall. Dr Prescott was immediately summoned and arrived as soon as possible, but the child died shortly after his arrival. Much sympathy is expressed for the parents in the loss.
