#### Awful Ravages Of Plague In Manchuria

HARBIN Manchuria, Feb 6-Already nearly 6,000 bodies of victims of the plag ue have been burned or buried in the out skirts of Harbin, Forty eight hundred of these came from the Chinese town and thousand from the Russian quarter Yes terday sixteen stacks of coffins and seven pits filled with bodies and oiled logs blaz ed outside the town.

The mortality among the physicians and the hospital attendants is high, con sidering the means taken for their protect ion, and doctors, nurses and orderlies are succumbing to the disease The sanitary authorities hope soon to test serum of their own manufacture, from the Man churian baccillia, as the foreign importat ion have proved ineffective.

The happening in Europe in the 19th century when the "Black Death swept through the country are being repeated here Fears bordering on panic have griped the chinese At first they defied the medic al officers and kept their sick and dead hid the purpose of carrying out the ancient funeral rites Now it is brother against brother, father against son The stricken ones are forced into the streets, to starve or freeze, or to fall perishing from the swift and deadly attack the plague makes upon its victims Passers by avoid them, but sometimes those | engaged in sanitary work, masked and bandaged, reach them before they | die and cart them to the house, pestor, if they are dead, to the funeral pyres.

ODESSA, Feb 6 it is reporaed that the plague has appeared in Trans Baikalia, region in the western part of Amur in East Siberia.

ST PETERBURG, Feb 6 -One hun dred deaths from the plague are reported in Kwancheng Tse, a large town west of Kirin Province, close to the Manchurian Railway.

Addressing the Reichstag on the subject of the constitution proposed for Alsac-Lorraine, Chancellor von Bethmann Hollweg on Saturday made a strong declaration of the gov ernment's internal policy and firm in tention to maintain Prussia's suprem acy in the councils of the empire. The chancellor said that the govern ment was working always toward granting more independence to the conquered provinces but was firmly resolved to suppress energetically all efforts to arouse a feeling antagonistic as such efforts only hindered the inh filment of Germanys intentions.

King Georges advisers this week instituted criminal libel proceedings with the object of ending once for all the rumors which have been freely circulated for years that His Majesty when in the navy, was morganatically married to a daughter of an admiral stationed at Malta. The defendant in the case, Edward M Mvlius, who is connected with the paper The Libera tor published in Paris which printed the disgraceful and untruthful slands on which the libel charge was based, was found guilty on Wednesday and sentenced to a years imprisonment; It was proved that the King had not been in Malta for at least two years previous to the time when the alleged marriage was supposed to have taken place. The suit had been taken to vindicate His Majesty as husband and father and not as Monarch. After sen tence had been passed Sir Rufus Is aacs, the Attorney General, read a let ter signed by the King and authoriz ing him to state publicly that the writer had never been married except to Queen Mary had never gone through a ceremony of marriage ex cept with the Queen and that he he would have attended the proceed ings to give evidence to this effect ex cept for the advice of the law officers of the Crown that it would be uncon stitutional for him to do so.



#### ELASTIC ROADS IN SWITZER-LAND.

(London World)

An interesting experiment has been made with promising results at Zurich. Fine gravel, the grains averag ing from one-twentieth to one-twelfth of an inch in diameter, the whole care fully freed from earthy substances, were coated in a revolving drum with tar. These pellets were then carefully dried and hardened, and after eight or ten weeks were spread during dry weather in a thick layer upon a prepared roadbed and rolled.
