Mr Guernsey settled in Grand Prairie many years ago and Mr Whiting only recently. That they have met with success can be seen from the fact that when they return to Grand Prairie they will close a land deal in which between \$75,000 and \$100,000 is involved. Mr Guernsey is in passession of about 1.000 acres of land and Mr Whiting has about 200 acree all of which they are going to dispose of to a syndicate who are anxious to secure It for fruit growing purposes.

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
