New Brunswick Not Advertised

Among the passengers arriving in the city yesterday on the S S Tunisian were H Guernsey and Victor Whiting of Grand Prairie (B C), two successful Englishmen who are just returning from a trip to their old home. Mr Guernsey settled in Grand Prairie many years ago and Mr Whiting only recently. That they have met with success can be seen from the fact that when they return to Grand Prairie they will close a land deal in which between \$75,000 and \$100,000 is involved. Mr Guernsey is in possession of about 1,000 acres of land and Mr Whiting has about 200 acres all of which they are going to dispose of to a syndicate who are anxious to secure it for fruit growing purposes.

While referring to the way in which things are coming generally in the west Mr Guernsey said: "What is the matter with the New Brunswickers? While traveling through your province a few months ago I noticed apparently valuable farming land lying idle. You don't seem to be making the best of your opportunities. There is something radically wrong in New Brunswick. For one

thing you don't advertise enough. During my recent trip to England I noticed how all the western provinces were advertised. Very little was to be seen of what your province offers. There is no denial of the fact that you are certainly not making the best of your advantages."

Be it ordained by the County Council of the Municipality of Carleton as follows:

1st The Parish of Wilmot is hereby divided into two separate polling districts. No 1, namely, all that part of the Parish lying south of a line commencing at the International Boundary line, running east of land between W Loudon and I Daniel Merrithew, thence running East to Good Settlement, between land of Eli Waters and Policeu Good east to Williams' own road continuing east between land of W J Emery and John Mc Egan, continuing east on a straight line to Parish of Smonds and the polling places in said District shall be at or near the Public Hall, Lakeville.

The following is hereby established a District:—

No. 2. In said Parish all that part of the parish lying north of the line mentioned in the next preceding section:

And the Polling Place in said district shall be at or near Freeland McKenzie, Centreville, in said district, and the hour for closing the Poll in said district No 2, shall be three o'clock p.m.

The Chairman in District No. 1 shall adjourn the meeting in such district until five o'clock in the afternoon of the day of Election and the statements and check list from District No. 2, shall be deposited with the Chairman of district No 1 before said time herein mentioned for the adjournment of said meeting and the Chairman of District No 1 shall thereupon proceed to examine the returns and declare the persons elected as provided by law.

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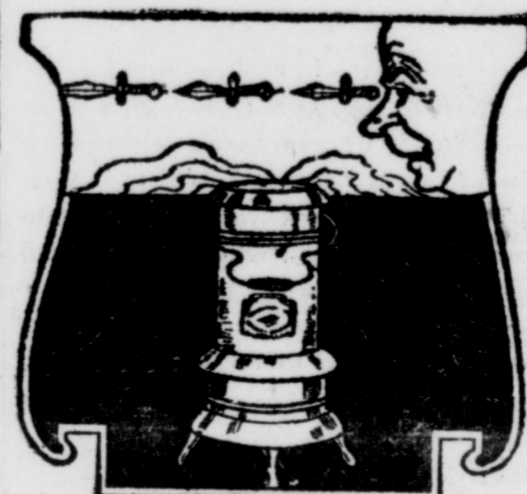
