MONORAIL SYSTEM READY FOR BUSINESS.

BERLIN, Germany, March 27.—The world's first monorail system for the transport of passengers and freight will open for traffic in Germany this summer.

The line, which is being constructed by August Schenk, the Berlin newspapers magnate, will be some 12 miles in length and will run between Bad Homburg in Taurus Mountains and Frankfurt on Main. The Schenk System is a combination of a German invention with the patents of the English inventor, Louis Brennan.
