RESTORATION OF FORT MACKINAC

The story comes from Washington that a persistent effort is being made to have the old fort on Mackinac Island restored and garrisoned for United States troops. This island lying in the strait of the same name commands completely the navigation between Lake Huron and Lake Michigan. The plan is that a garrisoned modernized fortress there could render important service in case of conflict with any foreign nation. There can be no doubt about the correctness of this view but it is fair to ask what chance there is of invasion at that point of the United States front? No nation but Canada could ever reach the spot for Canada controls absolutely the lower St. Lawrence. To think of Canada invading the United States is to propose to be even amusing. Eight million people settled along a coterminous frontier of thousands of miles are not likely to ever invade a neighboring country of a hundred millions. The proposal to revive Fort Mackinac comes of course from the State of Michigan, of which Mackinac Island is a part. The garrison was withdrawn from it fifteen years ago and the pressure to have it restored has been almost continuous ever since. This looks like a bad time to renew a frequently rejected proposal when Mr Carnegie is endowing a peace propaganda with a gift of ten millions dollars. That is the answer to the plea of defence if the restoration takes place on any other ground it will be an account of historic interest attaching to the old fort. In the time of Pontiac's conspiracy almost a century and a half ago to the plan of attack which failed at Detroit because it had been revealed before hand to the British commandant was completely successful at Fort Mackinac. This was the lacrosse race that is familiar to every Canadian and American schoolboy. Fortunately an English trader named Henry was spared because he had the protection of an influential Indian and he published a detailed and most interesting narrative of the massacre. After the failure of Pontiac's own siege of Detroit the Indian tribes were summoned to send deputations to that place with messages of surrender to Sir William Johnson and Henry accompanied the messengers from Mackinac and Sault Ste Marie.—The Montreal Witness.

CELERY VINEGAR

To make celery vinegar, cut into small pieces two-thirds of a pound of celery stalks, put into a jar and cover with half an ounce of salt, and pour over it one pint of boiling white vinegar: when cold, cover the jar tightly and leave for one month, then strain through a cloth, turn into bottles and seal, using new corks.

A CURE FOR CORNS

For curing corns, this is recommended by The Commoner; One teaspoonful of tar, and one teaspoonful each of coarse brown sugar and castor oil; warm all together and mix well, then spread a little on soft leather the size of the corns and apply. In two or three days, the corn, it is said, will be cured, the hard centre being drawn out.

Egg shells roughly crushed in the hands are good for cleaning enameled pans in conjunction with soap and water.

PROTECTION FROM FIRE.

The Chief of Police, New York, has called attention to an evil in the construction of buildings in cities which must often have attracted the attention of the thoughtful. The high buildings which are now erected in large cities increase the danger of destruction of life and property from fires. It is next to impossible to reach the top of these buildings with water, the many elevators become flue by which the flames spread from story to story; the high walls fall and crush the men who are endeavouring to stop the flames. Many of these buildings are supposed to be fire proof, and therefore indestructible; but their contents cannot be indestructible, and the flames spread through them far too easily. The bad conditions thus created ought to be dealt with in some practical way. The New York fire officials would limit the construction of buildings to seven stories, which would seem to be quite sufficient.

PEACE MOVEMENT IN THE UNITED STATES.

At the third International Conference of the American Society for Judicial Settlement Mr Choate former United Ambassador to Great Britain said that the United States Secretary of State Knox had practically completed a plan whereby the nations of the world can select the judges agreeable to all of them to compose a permanent tribunal at the Hague for the settlement of international disputes.

Speaking at the same conference President Taft said that if the United States could negotiate a positive agreement with some great nation to bind both to the sentiment of all questions that cannot be settled by negotiations no matter whether these involve honor territory or money a long step will be taken towards world peace. President Taft has already declared himself in favor of such a limited arbitration.—Toronto Weekly Sun.

The Push on a Train

One of the quaintest sights in Japan is the push man train, a little railway which runs or nineteen miles along for the seacoast between the Atami and Odawara, taking four hours to complete the journey.

Each car is hauled and pushed up hill by coolies and then allowed to run down the incline by its own momentum, the coolies jumping on behind. When skirting precipices and rounding sharp curves this becomes somewhat exciting, the sensation is rather like being in a runaway switch back car.

HOW WAR SCARES ARE PRODUCED

When jingoes rage with war alarms it is to be borne in mind that there is a deal of method in their madness. Francis W Hirst, editor of the London Economist, has done a timely thing in reminding the public that per iodical war scares in major part come from commercial, financial and speculative interests. Many persons and numerous business concerns, have money to gain by raising a war alarm. Battleships mean work for ship building contractors, furnishing of armor plates by the steel industry, casting of heavy cannon, new orders for machine guns, building of powerful engines supplying of costly electrical appliances. Enlarging the army necessitates more uniforms, more rifles, swords and pistols, purchase of horses, sale of gun powder. Great sums are made by stocking the fleet and supplying the army with provisions. Behind every move for increasing a nation's armament, there are motives quite apart from those of statesmanship, and totally distinct from the generally sincere but almost always mistaken a tainment of the professional soldiers of eminence all over the world who never think an army big enough and continually plead for extension of already large and burdensome military establishments. The jingoism of the professional soldier is discounted by public opinion. It is the influence behind him that are chiefly to be feared. With them it is business. And their business means the want of the public funds in non protective war material and preparations.

The Process of Staining Glass

The art of coloring glass has been lost and refound, jealously guarded and maliciously stolen so many times in the history of civilization that it seems almost impossible to say anything new on glass staining. Yet a process has been discovered for making the stained glass used in windows which is a departure from anything known at the present time.

The glass first receives its design in mineral colors and the whole is then fired in a heat so intense that the coloring matter and the glass are indissolubly fused. The most attractive feature of this method is that the surface acquires a peculiar pebbled character in the heat so that when the glass is in place the lights are delightfully soft and mellow.

In making a large window in many shades each panel is separately moulded and bent and the sections are assembled in a metal frame.

Apples can be kept a long time by coating them with a solution of three parts sugar and one part glycerine.
