## LEE AND OWEN'S CAMP

(Continued from page four.)

Miramichi road one meets such warmth, brightness and cheer privileged to hold service there in the evening of the 20th.

But to go back I spent two nights at Long's Camp. The Long brothers, Frank, Ira and John are woodsmen of experience, their father was an ardent woodsman in his day, a strenuous worker. My talk with Frank on our way out to the hill where one of the yarding crews were getting some fine lumber was to me a very interesting one, especially my listening to him. His experience as boss of a lumber crew at Okanagan, B C, and working in a mill there in summer, a mill that cuts about 100,000 ft per day—one of six mills in that province, belonging to one company, Payford and Scatton (as nearly as I caught the name). The largest mill being at the coast, a mill cutting about 500,000 ft per day, and having about 400 men, the six mills having as walking boss, a Mr McCormac, of Toronto, (It hink that was the name.) Frank also told me of Lord Aberdeen's 25,000 acre ranch, near Okanagan, with but 2,500 acres in grain, its 500 acres in orchards its 300 acres in hops, where in September, it is interesting to see the half breeds and Indians picking the hops.

I was much gratified to find in conversation with Ira Long, that he is enthusiastic in his purpose of purchasing one of the best farms he can obtain in the county.

I had brotherly fellowship with Samuel Belyea, the cook, who is a zealous reader of the Orange Sentinel. There was a pathos to me in the sadly interesting facts he gave me of the drowning of one of the sons of my old and valued friend, Thomas Forrest, of Windsor, which drowning took place in the West, and was such a severe shock to Brother Forrest and his worthy wife. I formed a gratifying acquaintance with the men in Long's Camp.

The Christmas season came as a peculiarly interesting experience to me. To note the enthusiasm with which the men who had been a large part of three months in the woods anticipated the home visits, the large numbers who went out, the small groups who remained in camp, the ease and zest with which men go out, the reluctance with which some of them return to the woods these, and other elements connected with Christmas are rest ones observation and are fruitfully suggestive of thought. Some of the Nashwaak men were not going to return till after New Years. It is regrettable to note that Christmas is a costly season to some of the men. In making my journeys I am brought into pleasant contact with quite a number of the homes, where the warm hospitality of the inmates is so far appreciable a feature. It was a treat to me to listen to Joseph Whiteside, of East Knowlesville, as with vivid and graphic detail he gave me reminiscences of 42 years, since his father and family left their Nova Scotia home. Prosperity has attended the labor of years, Backsets have been few Reasons for gratitude seem to be to the fore front. Enough has been given him to note me furnish comfort to himself and those in his home but to help different ones of his sons launch out on farmers nearly for them selves. It is gratifying to note that Mr Whiteside has been and is a hungry reader and prose.

It was a pleasure to me to note that William Hemphill is convinced of the wisdom of putting the hay and grain on the place as selling the finished products thus conserving the fertility of the farm. His goodly sized stock is evidence of his fine horses stable and vehicle building. I noted with interest to the west he and J Whiteside were taking in the Hartland and Miramichi Railway project and to learn of the heartiness with which the farmers are taking in the same.
