
#### THE CLIMBER.

A general strike of laborers and small grow ers has begun throughout the island of Guad manufactures to pay the wages demanded. The sugar cane remains uncut, and the grind ing factories are idle. The strikers declare that they will not resume work until the con. cessions sought have been made.

The Dublin' Independment' says that the government wili appoint a commission to in vestigate Irish Finances, with a view to es tablishing home rule, and wil appoint a cont mittee of the Cabinet to frame a home rule measure Lord Courtney of Penwith has w it ten to Thomas Saxton, chairman of the Free man's Journal Company, saying that the time has come to recognize the facts and pre pare for home rule. The writer; though rat ed as a Liberal, has been a Unionist in Irish matters, and has heretofore opposed home rule. In his letter he describes himself as a Unionist. He proposes a plan to in sure the representation of all elements in the Assembly by dividing the country between two or three constituencies, each electing five members, and a group of constituencies. each returning three members.

French opinion, according to Paris corres pondents, is greatly occupied with Holland's proposal to fortify Flushing, because it interprets the move as indicating the intention of the Netherlands to throw in her lot with the Triple Alliance in the event of an Anglo Franco-German conflict. The semi-official press says that the fortification would have no political justification unless intended to guard against an attack by Great Britain, which Holland has no reason to fear if not tied up with Germany.

Hayti and Santo Domingo are again quarrel ling over their boundary and are now hurry troops to the frontier.
