Mr Harvey was assisted by Master Francis Glenn Adney (aged 8) who opened the recital with the Overture from Herold's opera Zampa on the Gourelay Angelus, and by other pupils of the school. Mrs Wm D Rankin sang beautifully Kipling's Mother O Mine (the music by Tours,) and again with great sweetness with her sister Mrs Adney in the duet Sing Sweet Bird. Miss Pessie McKibbin's contralto voice has never seemed sweeter than in Lyne's He was a Prince and our popular tenor Mr Harry Dunbar sang in true Scotch brogue I Love A Lassie. Although Mrs Adney's splendidly trained voice is known to us, it seemed as if its range and wonderful flexibility were never so well shown as in the extremely difficult Cavatino from the Barber of Seville, Uua Voce Poce Fa one of Adelina Patti's show pieces. With Mrs Adney and Mr Dunbar in duet, Hunting Tower an old Scotch ballad, closed as a delightful musical evening as has ever been heard in Woodstock, and that is saying a great deal.

Mr Harvey expects shortly to take up his residence in Vancouver, B.C. He has lately been teaching a successful class in piano at McAdam Junction and will make music his profession in his new home. We wish him all success.
