## JOHN S. GRAY.

The death occurred at his home over the Post Office on Sunday evening January 15th, of John S. Gray aged 72 years and 10 months. He had a stroke of paralysis on December 13th, which left him nearly helpless; but he was conscious until the last and bore his illness without a murmur. He spent the early part of his life at sea going on long voyages to the West Indies and other places. After that he spent some years in the lumber country of California and British Columbia. He came home on his father's death to take charge of the homestead at St. George. He moved to Woodstock 21 years ago and for ten summers was night watch at Frederick Moores' mill, after that he did carpentry work until last February when he became janitor of the Post Office. He leaves a widow, who was Miss Isabella C. Dalling, daughter of the late Thomas Dalling, of Richmond, two sisters, Mrs. Charles Mitchell and Mrs. Isabella Smith of Milltown, Me., and two brothers, Daniel of Milltown, Me., and Robert of St. George. An only son died nearly three years ago. The funeral was held on Tuesday afternoon at 2.30 o'clock at St. Luke's church. The service was conducted by the Rev. Mr. Jenkins who made a very appropriate address. The pall bearers were, W. B. Nicholson, C. L. S. Raymond, Uriah Hanson and Thomas McCaffery. Interment in the Parish church cemetery.

## \$8,000 FIRE AT ANDOVER LAST NIGHT.

Andover, Jan 22.—The grist mill owned by the Perth Milling Company was destroyed by fire tonight. The blaze broke out at 10 o'clock and, as the mill was situated outside the town water supply, little could be done to check the flames.

The loss is placed at \$8,000 and as far as is known there was no insurance carried.

The origin of the fire is not definitely known, but it is thought to have started from the boiler.
