BLOCKADE OF RAILWAYS IN CALIFORNIA

Sacramento, Cal., 14.—With hundreds of men battling with the snowchoked passages of the Sierras in an effort to keep the railroad lines clear and bring relief to the stalled overland passages and mail trains, all the gigantic resources of the Southern Pacific and Western Pacific Railroad companies are being brought to bear in fighting the worst snowstorm in the mountain districts in the last twenty years. Last night all east and west bound trains were moving on the Southern Pacific tracks through the Sierras and snowsheds which were damaged by the heavy falls of snow in the last two days had been temporarily repaired.

Realizing the impossibility of forcing a passage through snowdrifts of six and eight feet deep, the Western Pacific Railroad officials last night ordered its stalled east bound overland trains in Belden and Greenville to return to San Francisco, and an unlined the overland in San Francisco, which was ready to depart for the East.
