Hints For the Woman Who Makes Her Own Underwear.

As a matter of fact, these scraps of lace are very little more costly than are some of the pieces of genuine old English eyeleting, but they wonderfully impress the thoughtless shopper, who does not take into consideration that a half



dozen nightdresses may be thus enriched with the addition of a ten dollar a yard piece of rose point. In buying lace for this purpose the woman who makes her own nightdresses should be careful to get a pattern of the medallion order, as these furnish the conspicuous insert for the front of the gown, while the scraps cut from about it may be worked together and inset at the sleeve tops. The nightgown illustrated is a charming model in nainsook and cluny lace.

#### THE NEW HOUSE.

Keep a Scrap Book For Valuable and Helpful Suggestions.

When a family decides to build a new house or even to transform an old one by additions and alterations the children, as well as father and mother, should be encouraged to suggest and plan for the convenience of all, says the Boston Cooking School Magazine.

A very good idea is to keep a scrap book or note book in which are put all the magazine and newspaper articles containing suggestions for porches or fireplaces or general building. To these should be added the observations made when visiting other homes or when going through unfinished houses. Friends are eager to give information and advice as soon as they see the plans, and by keeping all such suggestions in the note book mistakes and errors may be avoided and conveniences secured that had been unthought of.

The height of the laundry tubs and dish sink often determines whether or not the mother has a backache, and yet most contractors are allowed to put in the plumbing by their own rule, regardless of the woman who occupies the house. She must conform to the average, instead of having the tubs made to accommodate her. And why should the kitchen stove require a woman to kneel before it every time she looks into the oven? A platform under the stove will raise it to table height and save that stooping which so tires the back.

Sewing Room Hints.

All those who are fond of tatting will save much time by whittling a sharp point on the end of their tatting shuttles so they can pull the thread through the picots with the shuttle without having to use a pin or crochet needle each time.

When the weekly wash comes up from the laundry take the clothes that need mending and find patches of the material, yarn to darn with or whateyer is necessary to mend with and pin the pieces to the article to be mended, then put them aside in a drawer or sewing bag until you have time to sit down quietly and sew. Having everything ready, you will be surprised at the amount you can do at one sitting. By this method the weekly mending loses half its terrors for the busy house-

In order to keep spools of cotton and silk always handy have the drawers of your sewing machine fitted with thin boards through which are driven wire nails placed two inches apart. Place these in the drawers with the points of the nails upward and on each nail slip a spool of thread.

One row holds white thread from 24 to 100, another holds black thread and silk and still another all the odd shades of silk and cotton that have been used in the making of frocks or those that are likely to be used in the ordinary sewing for the family. of no
