### TOWN COUNCIL.

The town fathers met Tuesday night with Mayor Ketchum presiding. The report of the police magistrate from June 4 to Sept. 1 was received and placed on file. It was expected that the committee appointed to look into the matter of the Imperial Packing, Co would report. Mr. Smith, of the company, was present, and at the suggestion of the Mayor agreed to have consideration of the question postponed until Friday evening.

Mr. John Connor was present on behalf of the St. John and Quebec Railway Company and asked what the council proposed doing in reference to buying land for the railway. He stated that if the town buys the land the company will place divisional point here—if it is not placed here the company will recoup the town for the land.

Coun Dibblee wanted prompt action taken as the company want to proceed with the work. He suggested getting options at once and placing before council for action. If no arrangement could be made with owners' the only course to be taken is expropriation.

There was some misunderstanding over the different propositions submitted by the town and railway. A committee was appointed to consult with the railway people and report to the Council Friday night.

The report of Supt. Gosling on permanent streets was presented and referred to the street committee.

Following letter was received by His Worship from Ross Thompson, Chief Engineer of the Valley Railway—

His Worship The Mayor and Councilors, Town of Woodstock.

Gentlemen,—  
Re Right of Way through the Town of Woodstock.

In accordance with the arrangements made with a committee from your Council, our Right of Way Agent, Mr. Connor, with your Valuator, Mr. Leighton, called on the different landowners interested with a view of obtaining options on the properties required. The prices asked were in some cases satisfactory, in others unreasonable and, after due consideration of the damages in each case, this Company has decided and now begs to advise you that it is prepared to pay the following prices for different properties which are shown colored red on plan attached.

Bella Smith \$1,000; Chas Williams \$100; Wm. Clark \$500; Mrs. Poole \$500; Mrs. Woolverton \$200; Mrs. Bagley \$75; John Connor \$800; Bull Estate \$500; Agricultural Society \$10,000.

Should these prices be satisfactory to your Council, I would suggest that settlement be made where possible, and where such is not possible that expropriation proceedings be taken to get titles. The question whether such proceedings should be undertaken by the town or by this company to be decided at a later date.

This Company would expect your council to pass a resolution to the effect that when a divisional point is established within the limits of the Town of Woodstock, the town will reimburse the Railway Company the total cost of the properties in question with interest on same at 6 per cent per annum.

We are anxious to have construction proceeded with on this portion of the work immediately and trust that you will take such steps as will allow us to come to an understanding so that we can get possession of these properties and proceed with the work.
