**Tenders For New Steamship Line**

Ottawa, Spt. 6.—The Trade and Commerce department is already in receipt of several applications for tenders from a number of steamship companies which contemplate bidding for the improved steamship service between Canada and the West Indies. Tenders will close on October 10th.

What wheat is in some countries and maize and rice in others, the date palm is to the Arabs. Its native home is the region between Senegal on the west coast of Africa and the River Indus in Asia from about the 12th to about the 30th parallel of north latitude. The fruit is not the only produce of the date palm which is of use to man. The young leaves are eaten as palm cabbage and a wine is prepared from the sap. A single tree will yield three or four quarts daily for two weeks before the supply fails and the tree withers up. The entire leaves afford thatch for the dwellings; bags and mat are made of the leaflets, and foot-stalks are woven into baskets.

**The Sea Otter.**

The sea otter is nearly twice the size of the common river otter, and the fur, without finishing or preparation of any kind, is more beautiful as it is stripped from the animal than the richest seal-skin, which has to be scraped, plucked of the long upper hairs and dyed before it could be recognized as the beautiful object which the finished fur undoubtedly is. In the sea otter's fur the soft undercoat, the true fur, is as thick as that of the seal and nearly twice as long, while the long outer hairs are as soft as a sable's tail and often a pale gray, which gives to the whole coat an appearance as of dark fur slightly frosted over.

In Paris, Dr. Mangin, a celebrated alienist who is connected with the Hospice of St. Anne, where four thousand persons a year are treated for insanity, advocates dispensing with the male nurse entirely in the treatment of the insane, giving it as his opinion that persons of unsound mind should be cared for by women. Woman's greater kindness of feeling toward the patient is the reason given. Straitjackets and all other equipment for violent restraint have been done away with at St. Anne.

From Berlin comes word of somewhat similar import in the announcement that the Prussian authorities will open a women's prison in October, to be managed exclusively by women. Guards' wardens, superintendents, and directors of the prison labor departments will be women. Besides thirty-six women inspectors, there will be a number of women teachers. And the reason given is much the same; women's greater sympathy for the inmates.

**KEEPING FLANNELS WHITE**

When flannels become yellow the following treatment will make it white again: Boil in a suitable spoonful of flour in four quart of water, stirring well. Pour out of this boiling liquid over the flannel. Leave it alone until the water is cool, then rub the flannel, but use no soap. Rub in several waters. Repeat this process with the remainder of the flannel and water, heat up to boiling point. Rinse thoroughly, and hang in the shade to dry.

**Disease Carries Off Four Hundred Horses**

Topeka, Kan., Sept. 7.—Because more than 400 horses have died in western Kansas since a disease broke out, army veterinarians at Fort Riley have established a quarantine prohibiting the bringing of any horse on the military reservation. Fort Riley is wholly a cavalry and artillery post and there are more than 1,500 horses and mules there.

**Fireworks For Blackbirds**

Topeka, Kan., Sept. 7.—The City of Topeka has purchased a ton of Roman candles to drive the blackbirds out of the trees. Thousands of the blackbirds, some say millions, infest the big elm trees late in the summer and make streets dangerous and unsightly. Early each evening they fly into the trees in the parks and about the residences, and especially in the twenty acres of forest in Bethany College grounds, in the centre of the city.

Prof. L. L. Dyche, State Fish and Game Warden, told the city officials that Roman candles would drive them out. The city bought a supply and tried them for the first time last night.

**Suffragettes Invade King George's Estate**

Balmoral, Sept. 7.—Suffragettes invaded the grounds of King George's highland castle in the course of last night. The king is residing here during the shooting season and a strong force of police is in attendance.

The women, however, succeeded in completely outwitting the guards and left signs of their daring exploit in the shape of purple-colored flags bearing the words, "Votes for women means peace for the cabinet ministers," all round his majesty's private golf links. They removed and took away with them the flags marking the holes.

**West Received 35,000 Harvesters**

Winnipeg, Sept. 7.—Thirty-five thousand harvesters have actually been distributed over the wheat fields, is the statement made by J. Bruce Walker, in answer to a query whether 25,000 harvesters had reached the city during the harvesters' excursions. "We need fifty thousand, and the demand cannot be supplied this year. The weather conditions are helping matters considerably, as the crops are not all in a condition to be reaped. In the sections where the crops are ready, the harvesters are all busy, and when the other districts are ready, I am going to urge the railroads to provide transportations for the harvesters who have finished to the points where most help is needed. It is the only way left for us now in order to

save thousands and thousands of dollars for the farmers. Of course out of the large number of men who came from the east on harvesters' tickets a number never saw the fields, and just took advantage of the cheap rate to reach the west. Next year we must overcome this in some way, and have the harvesters selected in the east before our crop is ready. Just how this can be done, the future will unfold."

**Carrying of Liquor On Interecolonial**

Toronto, Sept. 7.—The action of the minister of railways in declaring the Interecolonial Railway system subject to provincial regulations as regards the carrying of liquor in Nova Scotia, was favorably commented upon yesterday at the annual meeting of the Moral and Social Reform Council of Canada with members present from all parts of Canada.

The executive was instructed to press for legislation that would result in the stamping out of professional and race track gambling and to seek legislation prohibiting the practice of polygamy in Canada, and set forth the need of requiring registration of contagious diseases and of a certificate of physical fitness to all candidates for marriage licences.

**Canadian Forestry Association Has Concluded Sessions**

VICTORIA, B. C., Sept. 7.—The Canadian Forestry Association concluded its sessions here yesterday. The convention was a great success. Resolutions were adopted, without discussion, congratulating the government of British Columbia upon the excellent showing it had made in forest conservation, and endorsed a suggestion made by the British Columbia Lumber & Shingle Manufacturers' Association that a course in logging engineering should be established at the University of British Columbia.

T. H. Finlayson of the dominion forestry service, whose territory covers Alberta, Saskatchewan and Manitoba, told of the harmonious results obtained since the first establishment of fire patrols of the prairie and interesting papers on different phases of the forestry situation were read by Clyde Leavitt, forester of the conservation commission; R. E. Benedict, assistant chief forester of British Columbia; Dominion Forester Campbell and Allen Forest of the Western Forestry & Conservation Association.

Dr. Judson F. Clark, in dealing with the financial aspect of lumbering, estimated that \$40,000,000 were spent on labor and material yearly in British Columbia. Various speakers alluded to the fact that practically all the young men now engaged as trained foresters in Canada have been pupils of Doctor Fernow, dean of the school of forestry in the University of Toronto.

**Paper Milk Bottles**

What profit is an inspection of cows for tuberculosis if we have to take the sterility of the bottles on faith?

To the old, old cry for "certified milk" has been added the demand for "certified milk bottles."

An inventor has answered the demand and placed on the market a new, sanitary, neckless milk "bottle." It looks like a marmalade jar and is constructed from paper.

Paper bottles have been talked about for a long time. Now after years of experiment, machinery has been perfect for winding strips of paper, or rather cardboard, into sterile, paraffin-dipped tubes.

All that is necessary is to fill these tubes with milk and seal them. Then you have the ideal single-service container.

Tests of the new milk container show that it has a lower bacterial count than the best glass bottles from some of the cleanest dairies.

The single-service milk container does away, effectually, with the mooted question of cleaning bottles which have been used before.
