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frying pan containing a very little lard or drippings. When done, drain on brown paper to remove any surplus fat.

COCOA PUDDING

Put 1 cupful of fine breadcrumbs and 1 quart of milk in a double boiler. When thick and smooth, stir in 2 tablespoonfuls

of butter, 1 scant cupful of sugar, 2 tablespoonful cocoa and 1 teaspoonful of vanilla. Remove from fire and beat 2 minutes. Add the beaten yolks of 4 eggs; then the whites beaten stiff. Pour into baking dish. Place this in a pan of water and bake 45 minutes. Serve with a hard sauce or whip-

ped cream.

One pint of flour, 1 teaspoonful of baking powder, a little salt and 1 tablespoonful of cream. Add milk enough to make a stiff batter. Put a tablespoonful of this mixture into buttered cups, then some cooked fruit, another spoonful of batter and steam 50 minutes. Serve with sauce.

KEDGEREE

One pound of cooked fish, 1 cupful of rice, I tablespoonful of butter, 2 eggs, pepper and salt. Cut the fish in small pieces. Wash the rice well and then cook it in boiling water with a little salt, let it boil for 20 minutes, drain it dry, and let it steam with a lid closely shut for 10 minutes without stirring. Boil the eggs hard, take off the shells and chop up the eggs finely. Put into a clean saucepan the fish, rice chopped eggs, butter, pepper and salt to taste. Stir

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
