Death of Father And Son

On Friday, Aug. 30th, at the home of his son, L. A. W. Brown at Avondale, the death occurred of John Brown after a brief illness. The deceased was 84 years of age and was well known throughout the county. His wife died some years ago, but he was survived by six sons—Lemuel, George, Hubert, James, Hugh, and Henry, and one daughter, Mrs. Christopher Kennedy, of Alberta.

The funeral was held at the Baptist church at Waterville on Saturday afternoon and the sermon was preached by Rev. E. C. Jenkins.

With shocking suddenness death occurred on Sunday afternoon of last week of George Brown, one of the sons above-mentioned. Mr. Brown was in the act of addressing a class in the Sunday school at Ashland, when he was seized with heart failure and died almost instantly. He leaves a wife and twelve sons and daughters. He was 55 years of age. His funeral was held on Monday in the same church where only two days before the funeral of his father was held, and the preacher was the same.

Hurricane Sweeps Coast Of Labrador

St. John's Nfld., Sept. 10.—Wireless messages from Labrador tell of the havoc wrought by a hurricane which swept that coast last week. The reports indicate extensive damage to fishing vessels and in villages along the coast. One schooner was driven on the rocks at Cut Throat and four of the crew were drowned. The greater portion of the fishing fleet is on the way from the extreme north of Labrador, a section dotted with islands exposed to the fury of the storm. Tragic news is expected from that section.
