New York White Slaver Given A Stiff Sentence

New York, July 24—The limit of the law in fine and imprisonment was given to a convict in a "White Slave" case in the court of general sessions today by Judge O'Sullivan, who scored the prisoner before an approving crowd. Joseph Milton, thirty-five years old, a bartender, stood up to receive what will very likely work out to a thirty-three year sentence in Sing Sing. He was sentenced to a term of from ten to twenty years in Sing Sing and a fine of \$5,000, which at the usual rate means about thirteen years. Milton was convicted of selling into slavery twenty-year-old Annie Liener, an immigrant, whom he found in an employment agency. The evidence was secured against him by Immigration Inspector Michael O'Brien, who is working up other cases.

How to Dry Peaches

Peaches, dried with sugar, are fully as nice as when canned, and if given reasonable care will keep without trouble. The Commoner gives this method of drying the fruit;

Peel nice, ripe, but not too soft peaches, take out the stone or pit, leaving the fruit whole, or at least in halves; allow two pounds of sugar to six pounds of fruit; make a syrup of three-quarters of a pound of sugar and a little water, put into this the prepared peaches, a few at a time, and let cook gently until quite clear. Take them up carefully on a dish and set in the sun to dry. Strew powdered sugar over them on all sides, a little at a time. If any syrup is left on the dish, remove to fresh dishes, turning the pieces of fruit. When quite dry, lay them lightly in jars with a little sifted sugar between layers.

Another way, less trouble, and "just as good," is this. Peel nice, ripe, firm peaches, cut in halves and remove the pit or stone with as little handling as possible. Lay on clean hardwood boards, wire racks, or dishes, in the sun, and let dry, turning each piece as it dries on the surface. Spread over the fruit a width of mosquito netting, or have them covered with screen wire on frames, to protect from insects. Allow to get perfectly dry, turning each piece every day, and as the fruit shrinks, laying the pieces closer together, and thus make room for more drying. When perfectly dry, put into paper sacks and put where they will keep dry and free from ants and insects. If kept covered while drying, no worms will be in them. They are like preserves. No sugar, no jars, no spoiling.

Roosevelt is Strong For Navy Expansion

Oyster Bay, July 26.—An attack on the Democratic majority in the House of Representatives for refusing to adopt the two battleship programme was made to-day by Col. Roosevelt. He declared that the upbuilding of the navy must go on if the United States is to maintain its position among the nations of the world. "Any talk as to what we intend to do about the Munro doctrine, the Panama Canal, the protection of Hawaii, or any other matter is not merely offensive, but contemptible," he said, "if we abandon building up the navy and show that we really have neither the power nor the will if the need should ever come to make our words good by deeds."

How To Treat Manure For Flies

Prof. S. A. Forbes, State Entomologist of Illinois, tells how larvae can be killed without serious loss to the fertilizing quality of the manure in which they breed.

Three pounds of high calcium lime to fifteen pounds of manure will kill 940 out of every thousand. Two pounds of iron sulphate in a gallon of water to fifteen pounds of manure will kill 941 larvae per thousand.

One and one-half pounds of common salt in a gallon of water applied to twelve pounds of manure will kill 888 larvae per thousand.

Alberta Wins Case Before Privy Council

London, July 24—Judgment was delivered yesterday by the judicial committee of the Privy Council allowing the appeal of the government of the province of Alberta versus the Alberta Railway and Irrigation Company in the matter of a dispute as to the cost and maintenance of bridges over the irrigation canals of Alberta. The final judgment is a reversal of the decision of the Supreme Court of Canada and upholds the first judgments of the Alberta courts.

The decision means that the cost and maintenance of all bridges of the future road, allowances over canals will have to be borne by the Alberta Railway and Irrigation

Peruvian Town Almost In Ruins

LIMA, Peru, July 25.—A destructive earthquake occurred yesterday at Piura capital of the department of Piura, the most northerly of the Pacific departments. The shock lasted 40 seconds and the city is said to be almost in ruins. While advices from that district are meagre, it is reported that a number of children were killed and many persons injured. Among the latter was Mr. Blacker, agent of the South American Insurance Company. The dry bed of a river was torn open and jets of water were thrown out.

British Public Men Are Terrorized

By The Suffragettes

London, July 26—Completely terrorized by the Suffragettes, English public men are guarded as at a time of Nihilistic activity in Russia. They are no longer worried by the risk of mere annoyance. They fear for their lives and the safety of their families.

King George's advisors have warned him strongly against any public appearance for the present, Scotland Yard's ingenuity and resources are taxed to the utmost to protect the cabinet, their wives and children and their homes.

Premier Asquith, Chancellor of the Exchequer Lloyd George, Home Secretary McKenna, Winston Churchill, the first Lord of the Admiralty, and other cabinet ministers, have received the most ferocious threats anonymously, what will happen to them unless they declare for equal rights at the polls. Not only are they assured that they are in danger of being killed, but that the burning of their homes and the kidnapping of their children are planned.

The bitterness and determination of the Suffragette campaign were again evidenced this afternoon, when Premier Asquith was attacked at the Chester Railway station on his return journey from Dublin. Another attack was attempted upon his arrival here. At Chester, Dr. Jessie Murray and Mary Gray, two Suffragettes, rushed the premier and shouted:—"Be warned in time!" Other women, who resented the attack on Mr. Asquith, turned on the suffragettes and were handling them roughly when a clergyman, who was standing nearby, rescued them. The two women were detained by the police.

On the arrival of the prime minister's train at Euston station tonight, another woman attempted to attack Mr. Asquith, but was prevented.
