Household Hints

RAVENSWORTH PUDDING.
Bake three large apples and take all
the pulp out of them. Boil one cupful
of milk and pour it over a quarter of a
pound of fine bread crumbs. Allow it
to soak for twenty minutes; then add
the yolks of three eggs, one by one,
the grated rind and strained juice of
of one lemon, the apple pulp and a
little grated nutmeg. Whip up the
whites of the eggs to a stiff froth, and
add this after all the other ingredients
are in. Grease the inside of a plain
pudding mold; dust it over with bread
crumbs, shaking out all superfluous
ones. Pour in the pudding and bake
for three-quarters of an hour. Turn
out, and pour sweet sauce around it.

TOMATO JELLY SALAD.
Soak one-half box of gelatine in one-
half cup of cold water fifteen minutes,
or till soft. Stew one can of tomatoes
till soft, cutting and mashing the pulp
to hasten the process. For additional
flavoring, stew with the tomato a small
piece of bay leaf, one-half teaspoon
mixed whole spices, one rounded table-
spoon of celery salt, and one-half a
small onion. Strain the tomato through
a puree sieve, and if there is not enough
to make three cups add boiling water.
Heat again to boiling point, add the
soaked gelatine, stir till dissolved, then
pour it into small tin moulds or cups of
any kind.

Sugar 2 to 3 pounds.

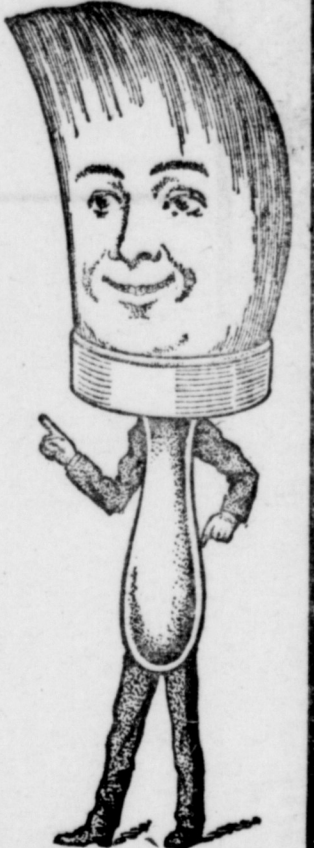
