Smallpox Raging Near Quebec

Montreal, July 30 - Utter and complete disregard of health laws in the matter of controlling smallpox is the condition of affairs which special inspectors of the provincial board of health have found to prevail in Indian Lorette and Jeune Lorette, two municipalities in the vicinity of Quebec city.

Absolutely no steps have been taken by the local authorities to deal with the situation and the inspectors detailed to investigate by officials of the provincial board of health in this city report that the disease is raging in many households. In no case, report the inspectors, has quarantine been established, and on their arrival they found people in the early stages of the disease walking about the streets and visiting

As a result the local authorities were told that if they did not take immediate steps the situation would be taken in hand by the provincial board of health and strict measures adopted. The local authorities thereupon decided to hold a joint meeting and are taking steps recommended by the inspectors.

The vaccination bye-law is to be rigidly enforced, quarantine is to be established wherever necessary, and local health officers appointed to take charge of the situation .-- Telegraph.

Study Of The Wood Products

Manufacturers Of Maritime Provinces To Aid

Ottawa, July 29th The manufacturers of wood products in the Maritime Provinces, particularly those who are interested in the final products, such as furniture, agricultural implements, wood for distillation, boats, cooperage, planing-mill products, etc., will be asked shortly to co-operate with the Forestry Branch of the Department of the Interior in forwarding an investigation of these woodworking industries, with a view to issuing a bulletin on the subject. Blank Schedules will be issued which the managers will be asked to fill out and return. Mr. R. G. Lewis, of the Forestry Branch will leave Ottawa shortly to assist in the work. He will call on many of the manufacturers and Secure data which, when compiled, should result in the advancement of the interests of the general public, and particularly of those having intimate connection with wood-working establishments.

Cadet Corps Orders by Brig Gen. C. W Drupy, C D C. Commanding 6th Division, Halifax NS

13th July 1912, to go into effect at Aldershot Camp. Aug. 16-21 Inclusive

No. 41. Cadet Camp, 1912. Vaccination.

(a) It is notified for the information of all concerned that all persons who proceed to the Cadet Camp at Aldershot N. S., 16th to 21st August, 1912, should be protected by vaccination. Persons found in camp who are not so protected will be returned to their homes. Kit, etc.

(b) Each person proceeding to zamp will require to bring one plate, Inife. fork, spoon, 'cup, towels, extra pair of socks, comb, hair brush and tooth brush.

(c) Cadets belonging to authorized cadet corps will wear the uniform and waist belt of their corps, but will not bring their rifles. Proys belonging to other organizations will wear the uniform of that organization.
