The adoption of the report was moved by Coun. Stevens, seconded by Coun. Williams and carried.

Coun. Melville understood that the firm was to send a man to meet the Council and discuss the matter.

Coun. Burt—That proposal was from another concern who wished to supply cages, which we did not think suitable for the gaol. The estimate is a rough one and it is hoped it will not cost as much as the amount asked for. It is proposed to have the corridor in the centre and cells on each side. (Coun. Burt submitted a plan for the purpose).

Coun. Melville would like a little more information in detail—more than a letter from a firm in Ontario. Coun. Perry thought a motion should be made to rescind the motion, otherwise the discussion was out of order.

Coun. Shaw—I would not take it we are bound to any particular plan or not, but still leave the matter in the hands of the Building Committee.

Coun. Perry—The Building Committee made a report and the same unanimously agreed with the report.

Coun. Williams said in seconding the resolution, I understand the matter would thus be brought before the Board for discussion. The gaol has wanted repairs for a number of years, and something must be done, it was generally thought.

The Warden—The report was unanimously adopted.

Coun. Perry—The question was opened for discussion when the adoption was moved and the report was adopted unanimously.

Coun. Stevens agreed with the view of Coun. Williams and moved that

the motion be reconsidered.

Coun. Shaw seconded—motion carried.

Coun. Perry would like to call on the chairman of the committee to give us all full information.

Coun. Burt said that aside from visiting the Houlton gaol, the committee did not go elsewhere. They corresponded with several concerns and secured other information. The whole gaol was found to be in need of a complete renovation. The floor was no good and it was very necessary that the committee should be given some latitude in making the necessary information.

Coun. Tompkins—Last January we appointed a competent committee and they have made a report, and I for one am willing to go by their report. It is not much use wasting time. Let the committee go on.

Coun. Phillips was much impressed with Houlton gaol. By having the corridor in the centre the prisoners would not have access to it out a wall and this would be more safely confined.

Coun. Melville—In going over the Houlton gaol I was much impressed. They have dungeons where unruly prisoners are put. Everybody is treated their according to his behaviour. The prisoners are not fed there better than the people who pay their taxes. All the prisoners work in the Houlton gaol. The whole matter is on a system.

Coun. Gallagher (Woodstock)—We want the best gaol we can get regardless of reasonable expenses. This has nothing to do with feeding the inmates.

Coun. Stevens—Would Coun. Melville wish for additional cells.
